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


CHARTER OAK CHATS.

EDITOR OF THE NONPAREIL DEAD

Has been ill since last Saturday. Death Will be Regretted by Many Newspaper Men.
H. W. Tilton, editor of the Council Bluffs Nonpareil, died at his Council Bluffs home this morning at 3 o'clock, the cause of his death being neuralgia. Mr. Tilton had only been sick since last Saturday and his regular "Lay Sermon" appeared in Sunday's Nonpareil. He had gained a wide reputation in the literary field by his "Lay Sermons", and he published them in book form. His death will create a gap in the Nonpareil that will be hard to close.
