

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Crawford county, Iowa, that there be submitted to the voters of the county at the General Election to be held in said county on the 4th day of November A. D. 1902, the question of building a Court House at Denison, the county seat of said county, at a cost of not exceeding Seventy-five Thousand Dollars; also, the question of borrowing not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand Dollars to build said Court House at a rate of interest not to exceed four per cent per annum, and to issue not to exceed Seventy-five Negotiable bonds therefor of the denomination of One Thousand Dollars each, payable ten years after date thereof, and drawing interest not to exceed four per cent per annum, payable annually; reserving the option to the County to pay any or all of said bonds at any time after five years from the date thereof. Also, for levying an annual tax at the September meeting of the Board in each year, beginning with the year 1903, on the taxable property of the County not to exceed 8 mills on the County valuation in any one year, and running from year to year in addition to the usual and ordinary taxes of said County sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and the bonds themselves when they become due.

Mother Kills Six Children.

Hazelhurst, Miss., June 17.—News has been received here of one of the most terrible tragedies ever enacted in this section of Mississippi, as a result of which the six children of Louis Westrop, a farmer living near Brandywine, were killed while their mother, who is charged with having killed them in a fit of temporary insanity, lies seriously wounded from a bullet fired by herself.

For the Release of Spalding.

Chicago, June 17.—Argument in support of the petition for the issuance of a habeas corpus writ for the release of Charles Warren Spalding, president of the defunct Globe Savings bank and defaulting treasurer of the University of Illinois, from the penitentiary, was begun before Judge Dunne yesterday. Attorney W. G. Anderson spoke for an hour urging that the writ be granted.

A. O. U. W. Elects Officers.

Portland, Ore., June 17.—The Grand Recordors' association of the Ancient Order of United Workmen elected the following officers for the ensuing year: President, C. T. Spencer, California; vice president, Francis Buellson, Minnesota; secretary-treasurer, H. W. Meyers, Missouri.

Fire Panic at St. Louis.

St. Louis, June 17.—Terrified by smoke and heat from the burning St. Louis riding academy and boarding stable, at Locust street and Channing avenue, 300 girls and 100 men employed in the Friedman Bros' shoe factory, just west of the stable, in panic sought egress by fire escape and elevator. Through the fall of the elevator and in crowding down the fire escape several persons were slightly injured. The fire completely gutted the stable and burned five valuable horses, causing a loss of \$50,000.

Storm in Georgia.

Columbus, Ga., June 17.—A terrific wind, rain and electric storm did considerable damage at Richland. J. M. Hurley, a prominent peach merchant, was instantly killed by lightning while standing under a shed. His wife was severely shocked. Five store buildings were unroofed and the stocks badly damaged. The new school dormitory, the negro academy, the Methodist church, the new Christian church and several residences were blown to the ground. The peach crop suffered greatly.

Wife Beater Killed.

Maryville, Mo., June 17.—George Arbutnot, employed on John S. Billby's cattle ranch in Atchison county, was shot and killed by Daniel Watson, foreman of the middle ranch. Arbutnot had been beating his wife and ranch hands who interfered were driven away at the point of a revolver. Watson, on returning to the ranch, took the woman's part, and on Arbutnot drawing a revolver, Watson emptied two barrels of a shotgun into him.

Train Plunges Into Ditch.

Barre, Vt., June 17.—In addition to property damage caused by a cloudburst over this section late last night, five railroad men lost their lives by a freight train on the Central Vermont railroad running into a washout at Middlesex. The Winoski river rose to spring freshet heights and several bridges were washed away. The dead include the conductor, engineer and fireman and two brakemen.

Illinois Democrats Meet.

Springfield, Ill., June 17.—Whether or not the Kansas City platform is to be reaffirmed and who will be the chairman of the next state central committee are the only causes of possible friction in the Democratic convention which meets today and it is not likely that either will bring about much of a fight.

DEBATE ON CANAL BILL.

Senator Morgan Discusses Diplomatic Phases of the Question.

Washington, June 17.—After considering the London dock charges bill for an hour and a half yesterday without completing it the senate resumed consideration of the isthmian canal question.

Morgan (Ala.) occupied the floor for three hours and a half, discussing particularly the diplomatic phases of the question.

From this point he was diverted by an amendment introduced by Fairbanks (Ind.) providing for the issue of bonds for the construction of the canal. Morgan vigorously attacked the amendment, maintaining the expense of the canal's taxation should be paid out of the treasury's current receipts. Incidentally, Morgan again opposed the Panama route and assailed the right of the new Panama company to dispose of the concessions held from the old company.

IRRIGATION BILL IN HOUSE.

Day Devoted to General Debate on the Measure.

Washington, June 17.—The house yesterday adopted a special rule for the consideration of the irrigation bill, which passed the senate some time ago, and devoted the day to general debate of the measure.

Today the bill will be read for amendment under the five-minute rule. Mondell (Wyo.), Tongue (Ore.), Tirrell (Mass.) and Shallenberger (Neb.) spoke yesterday in favor of the bill. Ray, chairman of the judiciary committee, made a long legal argument against it. Olmstead (Pa.) enlivened the proceedings with a humorous speech in reply to Cushman's recent attack on the committee on rules.

President Will Issue Statement.

Washington, June 17.—President Roosevelt returned to Washington last night on his special train. Soon after the president reached the white house Senator Platt of Connecticut, chairman of the committee on Cuban relations, called by appointment. The announcement was made at the white house that a statement would be given out today regarding General Wood's action in giving Cuban funds for the circulation of literature favorable to reciprocity legislation.

Denver Patrol Wins Drill.

San Francisco, June 17.—The competitive drill of the Mystic Shrine Arab patrols yesterday afternoon was won by El Jebel of Denver. Aladdin of Columbus, O., won second place. The patrols taking part in the drill were Moolah of St. Louis, El Jebel of Denver, Aladdin of Columbus, Arrarat of Kansas City and Zunah of Minneapolis. The announcement of the judges and awarding of prizes occurred at Mechanics' Pavilion.

Death of Pioneer Iowa Woman.

Keokuk, Ia., June 17.—Mrs. Anne Burkitt, a pioneer of Iowa and sister of Bishop Foster of the Methodist church, died yesterday morning, aged eighty.
