## CHURCH AND POWERS WIN.

LONG DRAWN CONTEST FINALLY SETTLED BY POWERS NOMINATION

Church Renominated by Acclamation, Crawford Stands by McCreary for Many Ballots.

Z. A. Church and F. M. Powers are the republican nominees for judge in this district. Both are well fitted for the positions and there is no question as to their election. The contest at Carroll was an interesting one. Crawford county carried out its intention of being loyal to its friends and is thus able to leave the convention without regrets. It early became apparent that Judge Church had a walk-a-way and at the request of Calhoun county Mr. P. E. C. Lally made the motion for his renomination by acclamation. Then commenced the real contest of the convention on the call of counties for the nomination for a judge to succeed Judge Elwood, the vote was as follows, Calhoun 10 for McCreary, Carroll 10 for Powers, Crawford 11 for McCreary, Greene 3 for Elwood, 3 for Powers, 3 for McCreary and 1 for Hastings. Ida 8 for Hastings, Sac 9 for Elwood. The balloting continued almost the same for more than 380 times. Greene however left McCreary and Hastings and voted 5 for Powers and 5 for Elwood. On the afternoon of the second day of the convention Greene county on the eleventh ballot of these counties left Elwood and voted solidly for Powers. On the same vote Ida gave its 8 votes to McCreary thus giving him 29 votes or within one of a nomination. It had been studiously circulated that Crawford was not in earnest in its support of McCreary and would leave him whenever there was a prospect of his nomination. This was not the case as was shown by the fact that for two successive ballots Crawford stood by its guns and helped to place McCreary where one vote from either Greene, Carroll or Sac would have nominated him. It having been proven by these three tests that McCreary could not get the needed vote from other counties, it was up to Crawford to decide upon a second choice and this they did voting solidly for Powers and thus ending a long hard fought contest. Crawford would gladly have seen the nomination of McCreary and there can be no question of a loyalty which stood by a candidate for more than three hundred and eighty ballots and which voted for him three times when a single vote from any other county would have assured his nomination. We have every reason to believe that Mr. McCreary and his friends appreciate this loyalty and place the blame for his defeat where it rightly belongs without unjustly accusing those men from Crawford who spent time and energy in an honest effort to secure his nomination. While the delegates from Crawford are not so well pleased as they would have been over the nomination of the Calhoun county man, it is true that Mr. Powers was the unanimous second choice of the delegation and they therefore have no right to complain of the result. Judge Church received a splendid endorsement in his unanimous renomination. He has made a good Judge, is well liked both on and off of the bench and was fully deserving of the high compliment paid him.

Judge Elwood made his own renomination an impossibility by his mismanagement and has no one to blame for his defeat except himself and the ill advice of some of his friends. Mr. Hastings of Ida made a splendid impression upon the delegates. He is a growing young man. He is certainly of judicial calibre and his many friends throughout the district hope that the time may come when they shall be able to cast their votes for him.

Mr. Powers is one of the leading lawyers of Carroll, his record is clear and straight-forward and both in private and public life his character is beyond reproach. We believe the republicans of this district have every reason to be proud of their judicial ticket and that it will be elected this fall by handsome majorities.

Mr. McCreary proved himself to be in all things a man of his word and his actions throughout the convention gave strong denial to all the defamatory stories which were circulated in this county prior to the last county convention. We regret Mr. McCreary's defeat but we are glad to state that it took place without the connivance or assistance of Crawford county which stood by him as long as it had reasonable hope of his nomination.

This is the end of a contest which has been a matter of controversy among the republicans of the district for some time, let us now hope that all good republicans will get together and work harmoniously for the good of the party and that all minor differences will be speedily forgotten.

### SPARKS FROM THE WIRES.

General Molto, captain general of Madrid, died Thursday from injuries sustained by falling from his horse. Violent earthquakes, accompanied by rumblings, have occurred throughout the Tyrol.

The Illinois supreme court upheld the constitutionality of the apportionment act of 1901.

A new steamship service between New York and north Brazil has been decided on by the Hamburg-American Steamship company.

Fire at Orange, N. J., destroyed Berg's hat factory. Loss, \$225,000. Employees to the number of 700 will be thrown out of work.

Colgate university conferred the degree of LL. D. on Sereno E. Payne, chairman of the ways and means committee of the house of representatives.

It is the intention of the navy department to send the battleship Oregon, now in Puget sound, back to the Asiatic squadron when the repairs are completed.

The board of trustees of the University of Arkansas have elected Harrison Randolph of Virginia president of that institution, vice Dr. John I. Buchanan, resigned.

John D. Spreckels and W. S. Leake, proprietor and managing editor respectively of the San Francisco Morning Call, were arrested Thursday on a charge of criminal libel, preferred by Governor Gage.

The fine old southern mansion at Eufala, occupied and owned by the family of Governor Jenks of Alabama, was totally destroyed by fire Thursday. The loss will reach \$25,000.

## SENATE FOR PANAMA ROUTE

Adopts Spooner Substitute for Hepburn Canal Bill.

HAS MAJORITY OF EIGHT VOTES

Provides for the issuance of \$130,000,000 in 2 Per Cent Gold Bonds for Building and for a Supervising Commission—Morgan Closes Debate.

Washington, June 20.—An isthmian canal, while not assured, is nearer to construction than it has ever been. The senate yesterday, by a majority of eight votes, adopted the Spooner substitute for the Hepburn Nicaragua canal bill, the vote on the substitute being 42 to 34. After two amendments to the measure had been adopted, one providing for a commission of seven to supervise the construction of the canal and the other providing for the issuance of \$130,000,000 of 2 per cent gold bonds to raise money with which to construct the waterway, it was passed by a vote of 67 to 6.

It has been evident for several days that the Spooner substitute, which, in brief, provides that the president shall select the Panama route if he can obtain a clear title to the Panama Canal company's property, but otherwise he shall adopt the Nicaragua route, would command the votes of a majority of the senate. The Panama route was considered more desirable by the senate than the Nicaragua route.

The only question left open is the title to the property, and that the president will determine if the house should adopt the senate's amendment to its bill.

Morgan (Ala.) closed the day's debate with an earnest appeal for the adoption of the Nicaragua route. He had been preceded by Clark (Mont.) in support of the Nicaragua route, and Allison (Ia.) in support of the Spooner proposition. Only minor amendments, except those indicated, were adopted, all others being voted down.

The senate had some debate over the trouble into which it had gotten with the house over amendments to the army appropriation bill and finally asked for a conference with the house, finally ignoring "the offensive message" which caused the trouble.

The Spooner amendment, as adopted, provides that the president, through the law officers of the government, shall determine whether a clear title can be secured of the Panama property, rights and concessions. If he shall be satisfied that such title can be obtained, he shall purchase the property, rights and concessions for \$40,000,000. If, in his opinion, a clear title cannot be obtained, he shall proceed to construct an isthmian canal by the Nicaragua route.

Section 5 appropriates \$10,000,000 toward the project contemplated and provides that appropriations are not to exceed the aggregate additional sum of \$135,000,000 if the Panama route be adopted, or \$180,000,000 should the Nicaragua route be selected.

### COOPER ON PHILIPPINES.

Contents in the House That It Should Not Be a Party Question.

Washington, June 20.—The opening day of the week's debate on the Philippine government bill in the house was signalized by a remarkably strong and exhaustive speech by Cooper (Wis.), chairman of the committee on insular affairs. He spoke for almost three hours and was given close attention by both sides of the house. Much of the speech was a general defense of the policy pursued by the administration and drew repeated applause from his side of the house. He contended that the problem of the Philippines should not be a party question; that both political parties brought on the war with Spain and the votes of members of both parties ratified the treaty which made the islands American territory. The most telling portion of his speech was the parallel he drew between the present attitude of the opposition and the attitude of the opposition during and immediately succeeding the civil war. Jones (Va.) made an able presentation of the Democratic position, but he yielded the floor after speaking about an hour.

Final Conference on Cuban Matter. Washington, June 20.—It is expected by the leaders on both sides of the Cuban reciprocity question in the senate that today's Republican conference will be final and that after the adjournment of the conference it will be definitely known whether the Cuban committee will report a bill or not. Some of the reciprocity advocates say they still hope to accomplish something. Others admit the prospect is not bright. The friends of beet sugar say they have announced their position and will not change their attitude toward the proposed legislation. They also generally speak in opposition to a reciprocity treaty and express the opinion that the entire question should be allowed to go over until next session.

Chicago, June 20.—Felippo Rini and Dominica Bismonte, young Italians, were convicted of the murder of Antonio Natall yesterday and their punishment was fixed at imprisonment for life. With Bismonte and several countrymen the dead man had worked all summer as a section hand on a railroad near Warsaw, Wis., and came to Chicago with about \$2,000, on his way back to Sicily, where he was to marry his sweetheart.
