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TELLS OF HIS VACATION.

Rev. F. Lothringer Visits Scenes of His Boyhood and Enjoys Boat Rides.

As my recent trip east may interest my friends and acquaintances, I will give a short description thereof.

On Friday, May 30 just after the Southern District Conference of Iowa had taken place here, I left for Rock Island, my home to visit my mother, sister, and two brothers. The latter gave me a ride down the Mississippi to Buffalo, Ia. and Andalusia, Ill. in their gasoline launch Lorraine (French for Lothringer) which they had themselves constructed. It is furnished with seats beds and a kitchen, for extended trips, comfortable bachelor quarters. They made a trip to Chattanooga, Tenn. one winter and to New Orleans, last winter.

Sunday morning I attended services in the beautiful German Lutheran church, Gothic style, fresco and paintings adorning the walls, the four evangelists in colored glass forming four windows.

Monday morning I left for Chicago, to visit a sister and cousins.

Wednesday morning the Synod at Milwaukee began to hold sessions. There were 18 in all, mornings and afternoons. In the evening, we made calls, or attended services, or visited points of interest. One of these services was for the deaf and dumb, or deaf mutes. A German pastor preached, and his entire sermon was given by the missionary in sign language. There was a confirmation of a young lady, the questions being put in English and signs, the answers given in words, of a peculiar metallic sound. One service was a song recital. There were solos, duets, trios and selections by the mixed and male and college choruses, and hymns by the congregation and scripture passages by the pastor. There were selections from oratorios, such as "Creation," "Elijah" and "Messiah," it was something wonderful and unique. There were likewise a Missionary and Pastoral service. Our visit to Concordia college, inspecting the buildings and remembering our own college days, to the Old Soldiers' Home, a beautiful place where over 1000 veterans of Wisconsin are clothed and fed and pensioned and even paid for any extra labor; and to White Fish Bay, north of Milwaukee, a splendid summer resort with hundreds of tables and chairs in the open air, terraces and zigzag paths down to the waters of the lake where waves four feet high came rolling in a distance of 15 feet.

At the Synodical meetings which were attended by about 550 voting members and at least 250 guests, I met many of my old acquaintances and was overjoyed to see three of my classmates of 1888 whom I had not seen for 14 years. At the sessions, our Seminars and Colleges and Missions etc were discussed. Returned to Chicago Saturday, June 14, met my relatives again, attended services and visited Humboldt Park. Returned to Rock Island Monday

and had another boat ride. A gasoline launch is quite an improvement on a sail boat, as this is better than a row boat. Started from Davenport and stayed at Cedar Rapids with a brother minister during a four hours' wait. At Marshalltown our train ran over a colored person, severing his right lower limb below the knee. He tried to board a vestibule which was closed. It was raining at the time and there was thunder and lightning. At Joliet, going to Chicago, I missed, a few hours ahead, a downpour of rain and a wash-out of the railroad tracks. At Chicago, the day after I left, there was a beef trust strike in which many were injured by the galloping horses or the strikers.

So I felt grateful at my return, safe and sound, invigorated in body and spirit.

Immigration Bill Reported.
 Washington, June 24.—Senator Penrose, from the committee on immigration, yesterday reported the general immigration bill. There are numerous amendments, in addition to the amendment changing the educational test. Among these is one increasing the head tax on immigrants to \$3 per head, and extending it to immigrants coming in overland, which is to be paid by the transportation companies carrying the immigrants.

Spaulding Out of a Job.
 Washington, June 24.—The Post says: General O. L. Spaulding, first assistant secretary of the treasury, has been definitely notified by Secretary Shaw that he is to retire. He probably will not again exercise the functions of assistant secretary, being at the present time on a leave of absence.

Pottery Combine Formed.
 Pittsburg, June 24.—A combine of six of the largest white ware pottery plants in the country has been consummated and the charter was granted yesterday. The new company will probably be known as the American Pottery company and will be capitalized at \$5,000,000.

Miss Toppan Sent to Asylum.
 Barnstable, Mass., June 24.—Miss Jane Toppan, who was on trial here on the charge of poisoning Mrs. Gibbs, for whom she acted as nurse, was found not guilty by reason of insanity and by orders of the court she was committed to the Taunton insane asylum for the rest of her life.

Fireman Shoots Himself.
 Omaha, June 24.—Because a married woman with whom he was in love scorned him, Fireman J. H. Hartman ended his life yesterday by shooting himself in the forehead. He resigned his position in the fire department and bid farewell to his friends before ending his existence.

Fatal Quarrel Over Rent.
 Kansas City, June 24.—Dr. Louis Zorn, a retired dentist who owns much property in this city, last night shot and mortally wounded Albert Zecker, a tenant, as the result of a dispute over the payment of rent.

MODERN WOODMEN PICNIC.

Vail Entertained a Big Crowd Wednesday Last. All Enjoy Themselves.

The M. W. A. celebration at Vail on Wednesday drew a big crowd to that enterprising little city, although the weather was unfavorable in the early morning. The North-Western's excursion train started from Dunlap with quite a number; at Dow City many joined, and at Denison about 200 hundred boarded the train, headed by the juvenile band. The crowd at Vail in the afternoon was estimated at about three thousand people. The heavy rain of the night before necessitated some changes in the program and the exercises of the forenoon were held in the hall, the parade being postponed until 1:30 in the afternoon. At the hall Mayor O'Conner acted as master of the ceremonies, a male quartette favored the crowd with some good music, after which Rev. M. A. Albrook offered an invocation. The mayor welcomed the visitors in a neat little speech and Rev. Bennett from Manning responded in behalf of the visitors. The Rev. end gentleman is a good speaker and on this occasion was in a very happy mood, keeping the crowd in the best of humor during his talk. The speaker of the day was Mr. E. W. Houston, of Dunlap, and his address was said to have been one of the best given in Vail in many a day. At the close of his talk he was congratulated very warmly.

The parade, headed by Mr. Fitzgerald, marshal of the day, and the juvenile band, started at about 1:30. There were many beautiful floats in the parade, all touching upon woodcraft, the degree teams in uniform and the visiting Woodmen, all going to make up a good parade. After this part of the program was over there was a free open air entertainment given by a man and his wife that was really very creditable. The man was a thorough comedian and he was assisted by his wife on a number of musical instruments, much to the enjoyment of the crowd.

The ball game between Vail and Manning was the next attraction, and was called at 3:30. There was a large crowd in attendance at the game, which was very interesting throughout. The Vail boys were too much for the Manningtons however and the game was won by them with a score of six to four. During the game there were many good plays made on both sides. Hollock and Flange were the Manning battery and Riley and Strauser were the Vail battery. The bowling contest was entered into by teams from Manning, Manilla, Vail and Denison. Vail won first place, Manning second and Denison third. After this contest the Manilla boys felt as though they ought to let go of some of their money and offered to let Denison have it. This game proved the greatest excitement of the day, the room was filled with rooters and the highest excitement prevailed. Denison won out by a score of 12 pins and then there was much joy.

The Vail people are to be congratulated upon the success of the day. They worked hard to make everybody have a good time and their efforts were not in vain.
