





JULY CORN AT 90-CENT POINT

HIGHEST PRICE PAID FOR THE CEREAL SINCE 1892.

In That Year Corn Reached the Dollar Mark and the Present Rise Seems to Come About Naturally.

Corn went to ninety cents on the Chicago board of trade Tuesday. This is the highest point corn has reached since 1892 when it struck the dollar mark. When corn was quoted as high as sixty-seven cents many predicted it would go to seventy-five, but few thought it would go higher than that mark. No one predicted it would reach ninety cents, but now that this mark has been touched it is freely predicted that July corn will go to a dollar.

Cattle and hogs and, in fact, all farm products are commanding high prices. On July 2 hogs sold in South Omaha for 7.64, and on the same day in 1896, hogs sold for 2.95, which is the lowest point reached that year. There is a vast difference between the prices that hogs and cattle are bringing now and what they brought in 1896, and years previous to that.

WHAT CATTLE ARE DOING

The Daily Drovers Journal of Tuesday says of the cattle and hog market: "A fairly good run of cattle was here today. There was a decrease of a few hundred with the liberal receipt of a week ago, and was only about half as large as one of the heavy runs of the yards of a year ago. There was a falling off in arrivals on the quarantine side, and a marked increase in offerings on the native today with yesterday. Good corn heaves were scarce with nothing at all stopy being noticed.

Westerns were in the reduced supply with underfed natives being the rule. The market was in pleasing contrast to the dull market of yesterday to the sellers, with buyers out early and riding hard for supplies. Competition was keen for offerings, which resulted in sellers regaining the loss of yesterday. The general market was quoted 10@25 cents higher mostly 10@15 cents.

THE OUTLOOK FOR HOGS.

The course of the hog market is effectively demonstrating to the yellow journals that no amount of howling or

investigations will change an actual condition. The law of supply and demand is making itself manifest by a further reduction in supplies and continuously advancing market. Prices yesterday shot up 10 cents per 100 pounds and reached \$8.15 while today with further strength shown in provisions and a nominal supply at the various points prices were again advanced sharply, reaching \$8.15. The local offerings were of better quality and heavier in weight than yesterday, but notwithstanding this the market was mostly ten cents higher. Prices ranged from \$7.65@8.15. A year ago they sold at from \$5.72@6.90.

HAVE FAITH IN IOWA.

State Delegation Believes Iowa Land is Worth \$100 Per Acre.

The Washington Post prints the following: "Nearly every member of the Iowa delegation in congress has the land fever. Colonel Hepburn says Iowa land will go to \$100 an acre, because it is actually worth that sum as a business proposition; there is no speculation in it. The soil will produce vegetation selling at prices making land a profitable investment at that figure. Congressman Haugen has such confidence in Iowa land that he takes in everything he can get hold of at prevailing prices and lets go of not an acre."

"Senator Dolliver is perhaps the most enthusiastic 'Iowa land' man in Washington. He has talked hundred dollar land for two years and says now that price is almost in sight. The senator owns a fine farm in Webster county and says no man can buy it. Said he: 'If I would sell those broad acres at \$100 per acre it would give me quite a sum of money. I might invest the money in some apparently safe and profitable enterprise, might fail and I should be penniless. With that farm in my possession poverty can have no terrors for me. There will always be a good living for myself and family upon that farm. It cannot be bought.'
