Bonds Placed at \$15,000.00
The case of Numley, the negro being tried for the murder of the Milwaukee brakeman at Arion came up for hearing this morning. A number of witnesses were present and testified, among them being the two engineers, the rear end brakeman, and the conductor, also the restaurant keeper at Arion, and the carpenter who was with the colored man at Arion before the train passed through that place. The last named witness seemed positive that the negro accused is the one who told him that he had a fuss with the brakeman and had cut him. The case was tried before Justice McLennan, and County Attorney is for the state and Railroad. Shaw Van is attorney for the defense.

At twelve o'clock an adjournment was had until 1.30, at which time the attorneys presented their arguments. Mr. Shaw Van presented an argument in favor of holding the defendant, if he be held at all, on the charge of manslaughter, not murder in the first degree. The court however sustained the indictment and his defendant's bond was placed at \$15,000.00 to await the grand jury in October. McLane, the colored fellow arrested in Sioux City, was placed under \$500.00 bond to await as a witness.
