With its misfit ticket, its broken hopes and the extreme unpopularity of its editor, even among democratic circles, it is no wonder that the Bulletin starts its campaign by "throwing a fit" at the editor of the REVIEW.

OFFICIAL REPORT.

A. J. Barkley Receives Formal Acceptance of His Site for Post Office.

Hon. A. J. Barkley today received an official communication from Secretary Leslie M. Shaw bearing the acceptance of the government of the site for the new post office building at Eighth and Arden. The only stipulation is that the deed and abstract be filed inside of sixty days. The site comprises 100x150 feet and sold for \$14,500. Mr. Barkley introduced and passed a bill during his first term in the legislature providing for federal jurisdiction over any site to be chosen in Boone, and nothing more will have to be done in this matter.

It can be truthfully said that everybody is satisfied with the location of the post office, for it was either first or second choice with all interested. It is a remarkable fact that less than one year from the time that the first public meeting was held at the Butler House with Judge Conner, relative to a federal building for Boone, the bill has been passed and the site located within a stone's throw of the place of meeting. The people of Boone will certainly have the highest faith in the abilities of Congressman Conner and will always feel indebted to him for what will be the finest public building in the state of Iowa, owing to the liberal appropriation of between \$80,000 and \$90,000 that will be spent on it.—Boone Daily News.

A Working Congressman.

At last six rural mail routes will soon be established in all probability in Carroll county. Two from Arcadia, two from Breda, and two from Coon Rapids. Mail route agent, Johnson, said to us while in Coon Rapids that Carroll county was being served, and in fact the entire 10th district, much in advance of other localities. In answer to the inquiry why this was so, he replied that Congress Conner worked the route inspector harder than any other congressman in the state. Our Congressman is evidently a working congressman and is usually successful in getting what he asks for. It would not surprise us if Coon Rapids had five routes running out of it within a year, virtually covering the territory in all directions from Coon Rapids—Coon Rapids Enterprise.

Wisconsin Central Indicted.

Minneapolis, Sept. 5.—The investigation by the federal grand jury into the alleged unjust discrimination in freight rates by the Wisconsin Central was brought to an abrupt close yesterday, when most of the witnesses in attendance were told that the investigation would not be required. It is understood that indictments will be returned against traffic officials of the Wisconsin Central railroad.

Wins Race With Death.

Denver, Sept. 5.—The special bringing Mrs. A. C. Drake and daughter from Winslow, Ariz., to Denver, covered the 820 miles between the two cities in twenty hours and twelve minutes. The average speed for the entire distance, half of it through a mountainous country, was forty miles an hour. Mrs. Drake found her husband still alive and conscious, but very low.

Judge Durand May Recover.

Flint, Mich., Sept. 5.—Judge George H. Durand, the Democratic nominee for governor, who suffered a paralytic stroke Monday, is now able to move his limbs with considerable freedom. His son for the first time expresses the belief that the judge might now recover.
