ARBITRATION A SUCCESS

Teamsters' Strike in Chicago is Settled by State Board.

TRAINMEN FORM A BIG UNION.

Includes All Western Roads and a Test Strike to Enforce Demand for a General Increase of Twenty Per Cent Will Soon Begin.

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Arbitration as a means of settling labor troubles proved a decided success in Chicago yesterday. One strike was settled, one that was threatened was averted, and two were put in such shape that it is reasonably certain that they will be brought to an end today. The danger of a famine through the strike of the packing house teamsters and the bakery and cracker wagon drivers now seems a thing of the past.

The strike of the packing house teamsters was effective so far as the pickets of the union, stationed all over the city, from South Chicago to the north side, were able to discover, and not a pound of meat was moved by Swift & Co. by wagons. The usual consignments by rail were made and not interfered with.

Through the efforts of Frederick W. Job, chairman of the state board of arbitration, arrangements were completed for a meeting today between a committee representing the teamsters and representatives of Swift & Co. Both sides appear anxious to settle the trouble and it is believed little difficulty will be experienced in reaching a satisfactory adjustment of the controversy.

To Arbitrate Differences.

Bakery and cracker wagon drivers and coal and truck teamsters, who received the sanction of the teamsters' joint council to strike at the plant of the William Schmidt Baking company because some of their drivers had been transferred to other branches of the National Biscuit company and their wages reduced, quit work yesterday. The officials of the company applied to the union for a chance to arbitrate the matter, and a conference between the men and officials of the company will be held today to settle the trouble.

The strike of the excavating teamsters came to an end after a lengthy conference last night. Nearly every excavating and sand concern in the city was represented. Under the agreement reached the men are to return to work at the terms demanded—42 a day for ten hours.

GIGANTIC UNION IS FORMED.

Conductors and Brakemen West of Chicago Effect Organization.

San Francisco, Sept. 12.—The Call says that the largest and most far-reaching union in the history of railroads was recently formed by the railroad conductors and brakemen on roads operating west of Chicago. The men are dissatisfied with the present rates of wages and will in the immediate future make a demand for an increase of salaries of 20 per cent. The Call is in a position to announce that this union will make a test case on one of the roads. The organization was perfected last June in Kansas City and W. V. Stafford, a conductor of the Southern Pacific, residing at Oakland, was elected its executive head.

Circulars have been recently passed around among the men and as a result every trainman has signed the request asking for an increase of 20 per cent and making other demands.

Work of Locomotive Firemen.

Chattanooga, Tenn., Sept. 12.—One of the most important subjects considered by the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen was the question of founding a home for the indigent of every labor organization in the country. The Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen have already subscribed \$50,000 and the Order of Railway Conductors have subscribed a like amount and it is thought the firemen will make a liberal contribution before they close their convention. The biennial report of Chairman Hawley of the grand board of trustees showed the organization to be in the best condition since its inception.

On the Way to Des Moines.

Baltimore, Sept. 12.—A special car containing delegates from Baltimore, Philadelphia, Washington, Wilmington and Cumberland to the eighty-seventh annual national convention of the Odd Fellows at Des Moines left over the Baltimore and Ohio railway. The party is scheduled to arrive in Des Moines Saturday.

Red Men Select Atlantic City.

Norfolk, Va., Sept. 12.—At yesterday's session of the great council of Red Men of the United States, a report of the finance committee showed a balance on hand in all the funds of the grand council of \$47,217.45. Atlantic City was chosen as the next place of meeting.

Chaplain Shoots Himself.

Washington, Sept. 12.—The secretary of the navy received a telegram from Rear Admiral Johnson, commanding the Boston navy yard, saying that Chaplain William F. Morrison committed suicide by shooting himself at the naval hospital at Chelsea.

Sioux Indian to Be Hanged.

Deadwood, S. D., Sept. 12.—Allen Walling Shield, a full blood Sioux, was sentenced in the United States court to be hanged for the murder of Sarah Ghost Face Bear. The execution will take place on Sept. 24, in the penitentiary at Sioux Falls.

IOWA VS. DAKOTA.

Let us compare our Iowa state fair with that of South Dakota. Those of us who attended our recent state fair remember the beautiful amphitheater erected at a cost of \$40,000, with a seating capacity of 10,000 people. During the judging of stock these seats were filled to overflowing, while a number of extra barns had to be erected to accommodate the stock on exhibit. The attendance at this fair ran as high as 50,000 people. Let us compare this with a report of the South Dakota state fair as reported by Mr. W. E. Cole who has charge of the McHenry exhibit of Angus cattle.

YANKTON, S. D., Sept. 8, '02 Mr. McHenry.

Dear Sir: We arrived at Yankton Saturday night and unloaded Sunday morning. Everything is all right except South Dakota. The barns are an open shed against the fence, and the grounds are forty acres. James Williams of Marcus, Iowa, and Reedy, of South Dakota, are here with their Angus herds. There is one Herford herd and four shorthorn herds. The grounds are one and a half miles from town and there is not even a chop house on the grounds, we have to board at a farm house. There is one lot of poultry, a few sheep and hogs, the cattle and one fake show. Great is the comparison and great is Iowa.
