The farm is a beautiful one and has many improvements. In spite of the high price paid such is Mr. Goin's confidence in Crawford county land values that he is confident he has made a good bargain.

From various sources we gather that the recent frosts affected about twenty-five percent of the corn crop. The corn that was frosted will not be a total loss and those farmers who promptly cut it and shocked it for feed will lose very little. There will be little shipping corn in the county but there will be a great amount of good feed. By the use of shredders and huskers there would be an immense saving to the farmers of the county on their corn crops each year and we hope that another season will see them in general use. It is figured that the difference between using this process and allowing the stalks to stand in the field would show a balance of more than seven dollars an acre in favor of the farmer.

The school board, at their regular semi-annual meeting Sept. 15, appointed as trustee officer under Chapter 128, the laws of the last legislature, which went into effect July 4, Marshal Andy Bowling. Under the law all children from seven to fourteen years of age inclusive, are required to attend some school at least twelve consecutive weeks during the year, unless excused by a certificate as provided by this law. It will be the duty of the trustee officer to take into custody and deliver to school or to the parent or the proper officer all the children of this age who neglect to attend school, who are habitually truant and who are continually lingering about public places during school hours. The law prescribes quite a severe penalty for the third offense. It seems to be the intention of the board to strictly enforce this new law.
