Businessmen Industrious.



Meyers, Denison, Iowa, Dear Sir and Friend: About a week ago I noticed on the bill boards that the "Millionaire Tramp" would be played at "Boyd's Theatre" last Sunday evening and was agreeably surprised to see that the Author of the play was none other than our old friend, Mr. Lawrence Russell, the author of "Aberdeen." I managed to see Mr. Russell at the end of the second act of the play and spent the remainder of the evening with him.

He has a first-class company with him in this play and at present has five shows on the road and is on the high road to prosperity. It certainly seemed good to see Mr. Russell in such good shape and I am sure that all of his Denison friends will join with me in wishing him the best of success.

We had a nice chat over old times and it brought to mind many of the little things that happened during his sojourn in Denison. We had a good laugh over the delay before the curtain went up in the first set in "Aberdeen" occasioned by the absence of the chicken that played such an important part, and reviewed our Logan trip and remembered the solemn look that "Augustus" gave us at the Logan depot the next morning when, through the "make up" that he had failed to remove the evening before, he told us that the trip had plunged the Company about \$14.00 in the hole.

He played to a \$1100.00 house here last Sunday and reports show that the "Millionaire Tramp" is a success wherever it is played.

Mr. Russell still thinks more of "Aberdeen" than any other drama he has written and tells me that it will be placed on the road next season with a large company and that the scenery is now being made for the play in the east. He expects to make Denison with the "Millionaire Tramp" company some time during the present season and I feel sure he will meet with a royal welcome. He has special scenery for the entire play and while he will not be able to place it on the stage in Denison, will give them a good clean show. In the first act where the express train pulls into the depot with the tramp on the front end is true to life and is one of the most realistic pieces of stage craft that I have ever seen. In the third act he shows a country opera house with a play going on and in the wind up he leaves his audience thinking, as he does in "Aberdeen."
