Sample Ballot to Be Voted In Crawford County, Iowa, November 4, 1902. [NOTICE TO VOTERS. For an affirmative vote upon any question submitted upon this ballot make a cross (X) mark in the square after the word "Yes." For a negative vote make a similar mark in the square following the word "No."]. SHALL THE FOLLOWING PUBLIC MEASURE BE ADOPTED, TO-WIT: SHALL THE COUNTY BUILD A COURT HOUSE AT DENISON, IOWA, AND ISSUE BONDS TO PAY FOR THE SAME: YES NO. Shall the county of Crawford build a court house at Denison, Iowa, the county seat of Crawford county, Iowa, at the cost of not to exceed seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), and borrow not to exceed seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), at a rate of interest not to exceed four (4) per cent per annum, to pay for the same, and issue not to exceed seventy-five (75) negotiable bonds of the denomination of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) each, payable ten (10) years after date thereof, and to draw interest not to exceed four (4) per cent per annum payable annually; reserving the option to the county to pay any or all of said bonds at any time after five (5) years from the date thereof; also to levy an annual tax at the September meeting of the Board of Supervisors in each year, beginning with the year nineteen hundred and three (1903) on the taxable property of the county, not to exceed eight (8) mills on the dollar on the county valuation in any one year, and to run from year to year in addition to the usual and ordinary taxes of said county, sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and the bonds themselves when they become due.
