At a recent meeting of the city council the street committee made a financial statement of expenditures for this season. The report shows that \$25,000 has been collected from poll tax. This amount together with \$1200.00 has been spent on our streets making a total expenditure of \$1825.00 in street work. Outstanding warrants and interests have been paid to the amount of \$2,100.00 making a reduction of the city's indebtedness of about \$6,000.00 this year. This leaves the debt at present of \$27,000. Another year of such economy will place the city indebtedness within the limitation. The street committee is to be congratulated upon its able management of affairs.
