STRONG MAN FROM IOWA

Editor Payne Writes Appreci-
atively of Secretary Shaw.

Nevada Representative's Interesting
Character Sketch of the Man From
Denison.

Leslie M. Shaw of Iowa, Secretary of the Treasury, closed the Republican campaign in Central Iowa with a speech Monday night at Des Moines. To most of those who heard him this speech was the event of the campaign and the strongest dissertation upon general political issues with the tariff emphasized to which they ever listened. Of all the arguments to which the writer has been permitted to listen we believe this one ranks first, save perhaps that which Mr. Shaw made at Nevada on the money question in the never-to-be-forgotten campaign of 1896. The earlier speech was made by a man not widely known; but it was him the early and determined support of Story county in the Cedar Rapids convention of 1897 and so made possible his nomination for governor. That speech was his political start. Whether this later speech will or can have any corresponding effect upon his political fortunes is doubtful; but with those who heard him it established, we believe, his primacy among the public men of Iowa.

Secretary Shaw is a man of extraordinary ability. His keenness of perception, power of analysis, clearness of statement, tenacity of purpose and aptness of illustration are all of them highly exceptional; and the combination is incomparable. He speaks without effort, with entire distinctness, with evident fairness, with pleasure to his hearers and with the result of convincing them whenever convincing is possible. His oratory is more than instructive, entertaining or explanatory; it is effective; and effectiveness is the final test. Perhaps the most remarkable thing about his oratory is that it has not materially changed with widening opportunity and experience. His field of activity has vastly widened in the past half a dozen years, and he has grown in public recognition from a country lawyer to the spokesman of the Cabinet; but we do not see that the man has changed save in his influence and position. He has risen to his opportunities, and the Nation knows him now as once not even his home people knew him; but we never expect to hear him or any other man present a better argument than he presented in his speech at Nevada in 1896. Perhaps he rose to the same level on Monday night; but he did not rise higher.

His last speech would be called a tariff and expansion speech; but more properly it was a business speech from the present national and commercial standpoint; and it was a Republican speech. He covered much ground; but he advanced no policy that the Republican party is not and will not be for. He did not throw in personal notions but he stuck to his text. He was for protection without apology. He had faith in the ultimate effectiveness of competition as a cure for combination. He believed that protection is the basis of national prosperity and that uncertainty as to the tariff would impair or destroy its value and from this position he was not to be diverted. He believed also in the future of his country; both as to its prospects and to its justice. He sustained what has been done in Cuba and the Philippines, watered included; and while he refrained from predicting what would ultimately be the result of the United States he did predict with confidence that in fifty years and more the Stars and Stripes would still stand for freedom and opportunity.

Aside from his gifts of statement and of oratory, Secretary Shaw's most notable characteristic is that he never loses the main point; and this quality it is that marks the greatness of the man and explains his unprecedented rise. Better than any other man in the public eye he typifies, in our judgment, present day republicanism. The political issues of the present day are largely business issues, and he has the commercial instinct combined with his analysis and his oratory. His appreciation of a good thing in one direction, or his distrust of a bad thing in another direction, neither of the regular kind nor induces him to blind others to the everlasting importance of looking after those matters which are fundamental in our commercial system. His instinct and his caution make him a safe mentor to the President and a man to be trusted and sustained by business interests; while his courage of conviction and facility of expression make him an incomparable advocate of the cause he represents. Such are the good and just reasons why Secretary Shaw is regarded now in the nation much as he was regarded in Nevada after his speech here six years ago, and why with health and vigor his public career is only well begun.

A notice of the Shaw rally in Des Moines would be neither complete nor just without some reference to an episode at the close. It had been arranged that the secretary should be followed with short speeches by Judge Prouty and Editor Young. Judge Prouty seemingly undertook to break the force of the secretary's argument by himself offering a dissertation upon the "Iowa idea." It is doubtful if any man could succeed in such an effort, and no discreet man would have tried it. Certainly his attempt failed with the audience, a very large part of which got up and left him. Moreover he was followed by Mr. Young, who of all men in Des Moines had every reason to reply, and who shines in a short speech above all other places to the end all who had outstayed Judge Prouty's speech. And so it was that the great meeting was concluded with a bit of play in Des Moines politics. Gov. Cummins presided over the rally; as was most fit; but he confined his remarks to the introduction of speakers. He was not in voice to speak if he had so wished.

MORMONS NOT POLYGAMOUS. ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.

President Smith Pays High Tribute to Apostle Reed Smoot.
Salt Lake, Dec. 2.—In an interview with the correspondent of the Associated Press, President Joseph Smith of the Mormon church defined the present position of the church with respect to polygamy, also the ecclesiastical position of Apostle Reed Smoot, whose candidacy for the United States senate has resulted in an active campaign against him by the ministerial alliance.

"Does the Mormon church solemnize or permit plural marriages?" President Smith was asked.
"Certainly not," he replied. "The church does not perform or sanction marriage in any form that is contrary to the laws of the land, but when the prohibition of polygamy was proclaimed by the president of the Mormon church there were many persons who had contracted plural marriages, and that relation has been continued in many instances, because the men in that position determined not to abandon their families. This is erroneously construed as practicing polygamy and creates the impression that polygamous marriages are still permitted in and by the church."

"The two positions are not parallel," President Smith said. "Reed Smoot is a banker, the manager of the largest manufacturing institution in this state, and is interested largely in mining operations and other temporal pursuits. He is recognized as a capable and enterprising citizen, and his position in the church need not interfere in any way with his services to the state or the nation in any political office to which he may be elected."

Crosby in New Place.
Chicago, Dec. 2.—Owing to greatly increased traffic, the management of the Burlington system has created the position of assistant general traffic manager, and has appointed George H. Crosby to fill it. Mr. Crosby's appointment took effect yesterday. His headquarters will be in Chicago. D. O. Ives, formerly general freight agent for the Missouri lines of the Burlington, has been appointed general freight agent of the Burlington and Missouri River road, to succeed Mr. Crosby. W. Gray, formerly assistant general freight agent of the Missouri lines of the Burlington, has been appointed general freight agent of the same, with headquarters in St. Louis. Mr. Ives' headquarters will be in Omaha.

More Tribune Questions.
The Chicago Tribune met with such generous response to its queries to Iowa editors relative to the speaker-ship, that it is evidently trying it again. This time its questions relate to a matter of public and party policy and a more unfair list of questions we have never seen. The following is the text of the Tribune's telegram:

EDITOR REVIEW, Denison, Iowa.
Resurrection of ship subsidy bill imminent. Do you know any good reason why congress should ask general public to pay the freight for benefit of a close corporation of railroad ship owners? Do you believe in subsidizing the Atlantic ferry boats? Will you kindly telegraph your views briefly? The Tribune.

As a fair presentation of a great question this certainly is a winner. It smacks more of the prejudiced utterance of some daydreaming populist from Georgia than of the enlightened Tribune.

The following answer was made by the Review, although it was necessarily too brief to make any extended argument of the subject:
"Editor Tribune Chicago.
I favor the same enlightened policy of ship subsidies where necessary, that is followed by every other important civilized country. The same policy which made the transcontinental railroads possible at so early a date. I care not who gets the money so that we get the ships, the ship building and maritime independence. I am in favor of some policy that will make it possible to go from New York to Argentina without going to Europe. I am in favor of the policy of such republicans as William McKinley and Marcus Aurelius Hanna (God bless him). I am not in favor of the unfair methods of the Tribune as shown by the list of questions submitted and which I hope the Tribune will have the honesty to publish. I am not in favor of the subsidization of Chicago newspapers by the employment of expensive fast mail trains used almost exclusively for their benefit and to the injury of the daily papers of Iowa and other states. Ship subsidy would at least not injure any existing American industry."

Of The Germania Verein of Denison Iowa.
Know all men by these presents that the undersigned, being desirous of availing ourselves of the advantages of Chapter I, Title IX, of the Code of Iowa and all amendments and additions thereto and publish the following articles of incorporation:

ARTICLE I.
The name of the corporation shall be "The Germania Verein of Denison, Iowa," and its principal place of business shall be in the city of Denison, Crawford Co. Iowa.

ARTICLE II.
The object of the corporation shall be the mutual benefit, entertainment and pecuniary profit of its members and to provide and maintain a Hall and other means to secure these ends. It shall have perpetual succession, may sue and be sued, make contracts, hold real estate, buy and sell the same, mortgage and encumber and convey its property, both real and personal, the same as an individual, but all instruments of conveyance encumbering or conveying the property of the corporation, must be signed by the president and the secretary thereof, upon a majority vote of the stockholders at a regular or special meeting called for that purpose. This corporation shall continue until Oct. 23, 1922, being twenty years after the date thereof and shall commence business Oct. 23, 1902.

ARTICLE III.
The authorized capital stock of this corporation shall be ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) which shall consist of two thousand (2,000) shares of five dollars (\$5.00) each. Such stock shall be non-assessable and the stockholders shall not be liable for corporate debts. The shares of stock shall be assignable on the books of the corporation, but shall not be legally transferable until all indebtedness of such stockholder to the corporation shall be paid.

ARTICLE IV.
The indebtedness of the corporation shall not exceed two-thirds (2/3) of its capital stock.

ARTICLE V.
The officers of the corporation shall consist of a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer and three trustees, who shall be elected at the regular annual meeting of the stockholders, held on the third Wednesday in January, and shall hold office for the term of one year or for a longer period, if the stockholders hereafter so provide, or until their successors are elected and qualified. Their duties shall be prescribed by the by laws.

ARTICLE VI.
The officers of this corporation shall be as follows:
President, Barney Broderson.
Vice-President, Hugo Gebert.
Secretary, B. J. Sibbert.
Treasurer, C. J. Solomon.
Trustees, Dr. Mueller, H. H. Klinker and Frank Paul.
These shall hold office until their successors are elected and qualified.

ARTICLE VII.
This corporation may be dissolved by a vote of three-fourths (3/4) of the stockholders.

ARTICLE VIII.
These articles of incorporation may be amended by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of its stockholders at any annual or special meeting called for that purpose.
