Love and War.

The war department is said to be greatly exercised over the improvident and unfortunate marriages of the younger army officers. The pitiful case is cited of the young couple who have naught between them and starvation but \$116 per month and who consequently feel too poor to rent a home and who are otherwise put to it to make both ends meet. We know our readers will sympathize with these worthy young people but will feel nevertheless that if grim circumstance compelled they could wiggle along on \$116 per month, especially if the government furnish board.

Some marriages will always be improvident, although the improvidence does not consist nearly so much in the present wealth or lack of wealth, of the pair, as it does in their mutual helpfulness, their understanding of the situation, their determination to face hardship together if necessary. A young couple, given such qualities, together with industry and thrift, make no improvident marriage even though they start married life without a penny.

We would also refer the war department to the fact that the invited opposition of all the parents, since the time of the distinguished Mr. Adam, has not been able to prevent the millions of marriages considered unwise from a parental standpoint. We would advise the war department not to attempt a task which has baffled all the fond mothers and stern papas of creation.

Another thing; the war department should be extremely careful not to foster such a state of affairs as exists in European armies where, the restrictions against marriage are so severe that mistresses, illegitimate children and all the honors of illicit love are the rule and not the exception. The war department should offer a bounty in the shape of increased pay to the married men in the service, and further the false standard by which every officer is expected to live like the son of a millionaire in order to maintain the dignity of the United States. The alternative would be the establishment of an army of eunuchs to uphold the manhood and patriotism of American armies.

New Railway Opened to the Indian Country.

It is announced that the extension of the Verdigris branch of the North-Western Line to Bonesteel, S. D., on edge of the Rosebud Indian Reservation, is now open for traffic. Part of the Rosebud lands are to be opened for settlement next spring and it is expected that there will be a tremendous rush into this country now that the new railway is built. The line passes through some of the richest grazing lands in the world. The Rosebud lands themselves are known for their value in this regard and doubtless the opening of this public land will attract large crowds from all over the country.
