**STEAMSHIP SERVICE TO MANILA**

Pacific Steamship Lines Inaugurate Direct Sailings from San Francisco.

The Chicago & North Western railway announces that in connection with the daily trans continental train service, via that line from Chicago to San Francisco, the steamship lines from the latter port have inaugurated direct sailings from San Francisco to Manila, additional to the service via Nagasaki and Hong Kong. Some of the finest steamships in the Pacific are being used for this new direct service. As an indication of the rapid development of American interests in the far east, this fact will be of moment to all American. Ship via this direct route until further notice, and the sailing time to Manila will be about 28 days.
