DEATH OF ANDREW STEWART

After Short Illness of Two Weeks Death Claims Its Victim. Yesterday morning the sad news was brought to town that Mr. Andrew Stewart who had been sick for two weeks on Mr. Jas. Rollins' place east of Denison with pneumonia had succumbed to the awful disease. Mr. Stewart suffered untold agony before his strong physique finally gave way to the dread disease and death came as a relief to the sufferer.

Mr. Stewart has been in America ten years, coming from Ireland in 1891. He was a member of the Presbyterian church at Denison.

Deceased was born in Ballycoor, Antrim County near Belfast, Ireland, March 9 1870 and died December 11, 1902 being 32 years, 9 months and two days old. He received a good education at his home and worked for a period of six years in the postal and telegraph service of Ireland. When arriving in America he settled first at Oting, Wash., where he was employed by the Orting Lumber Co. and where he earned for himself a good name and many friends. In July 1893 he came to North Dakota, times being dull along the coast, and in November of the same year came to Denison where he has since made his home. While in Denison Mr. Stewart worked for Luney Bros. at the mill and made his home with Mrs. Thos. Luney. For the past two years he has made his home with Mr. Jas. Rollins east of Denison. For the past two or three months he has been employed by the telephone company and it was near Perry about two weeks ago that he was taken sick with pneumonia.

Mr. Stewart was brought up in a Christian home and has been a Christian all his life.

He was a member of Knights of Pythias and Woodmen of the World under whose auspices the funeral will be conducted. The funeral will be held Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Presbyterian church.

No Roads—No Mail.

The rural mail carriers are experiencing much difficulty in making their trips on account of the bad roads. In some cases the routes lie along cross roads that are seldom travelled by the farmers and in these cases it will require special effort to keep the roads open.

It is in the winter that the free delivery system is the most greatly appreciated and the farmers should band together to keep the roads passable. It is the duty of the carrier to make his trip if possible, but he is not expected to dig through drifts or to go any great distance out of his way. The routes are already above the 25 mile limit.

If rural free delivery is worth having it is worth while keeping the roads open and we trust that the farmers will lend every possible aid to this end.
