## SHORT HORN CATTLE SALE

Charles A. Saunders, of Manilla  
Will Hold Sale Dec. 23.

Mr. C. A. Saunders, of Manilla, was in Denison on Saturday last and favored this office with a call. He informed us that he will have a big sale of Short horn cattle at his place—Greenley Stock farm, on December 23. Mr. Saunders has one of the finest stock farms in Iowa, almost joining the corporate limits of Manilla, and he has it stocked with the best Short-horn cattle that money and good judgment will buy. He has just completed a very fine residence with all modern improvements and all who attend the sale will be royally entertained. Crawford county is fast becoming noted for fine stock, and at Mr. Saunders sale on the 23rd there will be representatives from all over the country. ### Electric Lights for Farmers.

A farmer residing near Pontiac, Illinois, was in the city a few days ago and told some of our people that the farmers in his vicinity enjoyed the luxury of electric lights. The electric plant in Pontiac is owned by a company, and the company has wired into the country for a distance of seven miles in nearly all directions. The company wires the houses, furnishes all fixtures and charges two dollars a month for lighting an ordinary farm dwelling. It may be that Hamilton county farmers will enjoy this privilege some day. We certainly hope so. This will be followed by the electric car and a water supply.—Webster City Tribune.

### RECOGNIZES ESCAPED PRISONER

Ex-Sheriff Seymour Spots him at Sioux City. May be Brought Back for Trial

The following from Monday's Sioux City Journal, brings to mind the jail delivery made at Denison in 1897. He was taken in along with a pal named Murphy and broke jail by digging through the wall.

Still another crime is laid at the door of the crowd of alleged robbers who were arrested in this city some weeks ago, and part of whom have been taken to South Dakota to be prosecuted for burglarizing a jewelry store at Canova. S. W. Seymour, a real estate agent in Sioux City, who five years ago was sheriff of Crawford county, Ia., has informed Chief of Police Davenport that "English Johnny" Lee, one of the crowd, escaped from the county jail at Denison in 1897 by digging a hole in the wall. He had been arrested along with Murphy, another member of the gang which was taken here for burglary. Murphy did not get out with his partner, but because Lee was gone Murphy could not be prosecuted, and he was released. The men will be prosecuted in South Dakota first, and if they fall of conviction it is probable the Crawford county officials will be notified to come after them if they still want them.
