ASKS \$5,000 OF NORTHWESTERN

A transcript was received from the district Court of Crawford County yesterday by the federal court of a damage suit which has been brought against the Northwestern Railroad company by Henry Dow for the death of his son, John Dow, who was killed by a Northwestern train at Dow City, November 13, 1900. The father claims \$5,000 for the death of his son. The order of the removal from the district court was signed by Judge Z. A. Church. A bond of \$500 was furnished by the plaintiff. —From this morning's Nonpariel:

Court Proceedings.
The grand jury adjourned Saturday morning, its report having been sent in and approved. No indictments were made.

Court was adjourned until Monday but did not convene until Tuesday at 10:30 a. m. Mr. Sims did not arrive in Denison until 10:10 to appear as attorney for plaintiff in the case of Lena Miller vs. Chas. Hartwig which is now on trial before a jury.

In 1892 Miss Miller was left an orphan at 12 years of age by the death of her mother and Chas. Hartwig was appointed guardian over the children. Miss Miller was taken to the home of Mr. Hartwig and sent to school while the family lived in town and to country school while the family lived on the farm. In 1898 she left Mr. Hartwig's home to work for herself. Mr. Hartwig says that she borrowed money of him and repaid it, was otherwise friendly and that he knew nothing about her demands for compensation until the notice was served on him. Miss Miller claims that she worked like a hired hand from the time she went to Mr. Hartwig's home, doing all kinds of house work and while on the farm husking corn and milking cows, that she did all manner of hard work while attending school and that she finally left Mr. Hartwig's because she could not stand the hard work any longer.

The lawyers fought on this case all day Tuesday and on Wednesday until late in the afternoon. The jury was out about an hour when they brought in a verdict of \$702 for the plaintiff.

Yesterday morning the case of Hansen vs. Remdy was brought before the jury for the settling of a dispute over a steer. Mr. Hansen claims to have bought four cattle a year ago last November from a certain Mr. Hunter, two of them being black ones. The particular animal in question is a black muley curly haired steer with its left ear punched. When Mr. Hansen bought the animal he immediately slit the right ear as he usually does with his cattle. He took the four head of cattle to the pasture of a neighbor where he had more of his cattle pastured. Not long after he went to see his herd and missed the animal in question. He did not succeed in locating the lost beast until March when he found this steer at Mr. Remdy's whom he informed that it was his. Mr. Hansen and Mr. Remdy were good friends and nothing more was said for a time. Mr. Hansen went again and told Mr. Remdy of his claims to ownership and Mr. Remdy claimed to have raised the steer. The third time Mr. Hansen went

he threatened suit but to no avail. Mr. Remdy lost his case before a justice court and appealed.

A night session was held last night to give Mr. Korte time to finish his plea for the plaintiff. About 11 o'clock the jury handed in its decision for the plaintiff. The case of Purcell vs. Romans was continued until the next term of court on account of the illness of Mr. Romans.

After the jury for the Ringer trial was selected this morning the rest of the jurors were dismissed as there will be no more jury trials.

The case of State vs. Ringer was brought up for trial the first thing this morning. A year ago last October while Dave Ringer was special police at the depot he ordered a few small boys home. They all left but two who had wheels with them which were locked. Frank Olson unlocked his wheel and left but Oscar Ericson delayed saying that he had ten minutes yet to remain at the depot as he was messenger boy. Mr. Ringer grabbed him in one hand and the wheel in the other and started off up town. After turning north from the end of the platform Charlie Menaugh and Miss Bobart came up with them. Charlie told Mr. Ringer that he ought not to arrest the boy. Ringer turned and struck Charlie four times with his billy club and then kicked him after he had fallen to the ground and would have continued his blows had not Miss Bobart run in and taken hold of the club and begged him to desist. The boy who was then working in the depot lunch counter was a witness to all that happened and Frank Olson came up on his wheel just after the first blow was struck. The case is now on trial.
