FIGHT OVER THE SUPPER BILL.

Husband Is Shot Twice and Wife and Her Father Are in Jail as a Result.

Sioux City, Feb. 9.—There is trouble in the Martin Timmerman family. Husband and wife failed to agree on the supper bill. Mrs. Timmerman wanted oysters and Mr. Timmerman wanted eggs. Now Timmerman is nursing two bullet wounds, his father-in-law, Paddy Farrell, is in jail charged with assault with intent to commit murder, and Mrs. Timmerman is in jail charged with disturbing the peace. Finding words of no avail in securing oysters, Mrs. Timmerman seized her boy and ran across the street to the home of her father. Timmerman followed and took the child. Farrell opened fire with a big revolver, emptying the chambers. Before Timmerman could get out of range two of the bullets had landed. None of them are serious.

Death of Sister Johanna. Leavenworth, Kan., Feb. 9.—Sister Johanna, one of the founders of the Order of Sisters of Charity in the west, is dead here of old age. She was eighty-two years of age and had been a sister sixty-four years. She was one of the original sisters in St. Mary's academy in this city, where she died.

Murdered for His Money. New York, Feb. 9.—Louis Mandel, a dealer in old iron, was murdered in his office in East Twenty-third street, Saturday, being crushed by blows from a heavy iron bar. He was in an unconscious condition when he died in the hospital. Robbery was the motive of the crime.

Find Mutilated Body of Peddler. Cleveland, Feb. 9.—Solomon Stein, a rag peddler, was found dead in his apartment at 132 Orange street, Saturday, his body crushed and mutilated. The cause of the tragedy is being held in doubt.

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ELEVATOR STRIKE SPREADS.

Chicago Teamsters Using Crisis to Demand Agreements.

Chicago, Feb. 9.—Unless the trouble between the Business Managers' association and the elevator conductors and janitors, who went on strike four days ago in fifteen of the big office buildings in the downtown district, shall be settled at a conference to be held today the men employed in the other fifty-one buildings in the association will be ordered out. When the business managers' representative endeavored to reach the strikers he was informed that settlement was to be made through Albert Young, president of the National Teamsters' union; that this settlement must include a signing of an agreement with the teamsters for two years by the owners of the buildings where the strike is now in progress relative to the exclusive use of either coal or gas, besides complete surrender to the demands of the elevator conductors and janitors.

The managers claim to be willing to arbitrate recognition of the union and the grievances of the men together, but will make no further concessions.

ROSCOE HERREID LAID TO REST.

Friends From All Parts of South Dakota Attend Funeral.

Pierre, S. D., Feb. 9.—The funeral of Roscoe Herreid at this city was attended by people from all parts of the state and the large parlor and galleries of the Locke hotel were packed with friends of Governor and Mrs. Herreid and old schoolmates of Roscoe. A special train brought a large delegation of old neighbors from Bureka, among them a company of the First regiment, the governor's guards. The floral offerings came from friends all over the northwest and the coffin was banked with flowers. The remains were accompanied to Riverside cemetery by troop B, acting as a guard of honor, and a large party of friends, where a simple ceremony was performed at the grave.

Packing Trades Council.

Kansas City, Feb. 9.—Delegates from five of the labor organizations in Kansas City, Kan., representing 6,000 workers in the packing house industries of that city, met yesterday and formed a new central labor body for Kansas City known as the "Packing Trades' Council." The unions represented at the meeting were the cattle butchers, the sheep butchers, the hog butchers, the beef boners and the cooper workers. President Donnelly will go to St. Joseph tomorrow and organize a packing house trades' council there. "The packing house trades' council will not ask for an increase in wages at present at least," said Mr. Donnelly.

Burlington Settles Case.

Kansas City, Feb. 9.—Judges Youmans and Prouty, members of the interstate commerce commission, came to Kansas City Saturday to hear a case brought by Gilbert Barr, a merchant of Kearney, Mo., against the Burlington railroad. The allegation is that the railroad charged him the same rates to Chicago as it did Kansas City merchants. The case was settled by the attorneys, however, and the commissioners returned to St. Louis.

Crown Princess in a Sanitarium.

Geneva, Feb. 9.—The former crown princess of Saxony announces that owing to the great physical and mental depression, caused by the refusal to allow her to visit Salzburg or to see her sick child, the princess yesterday entered the sanitarium of Timaterie at Nyon in order to seek the quietude and medical attention necessary in her delicate condition. The sanitarium is well known for the treatment of mental and nervous disorders.

All Quiet at Waterbury.

Waterbury, Conn., Feb. 9.—Yesterday was the beginning of the fifth week of the strike of the trolley men. No violence was offered in any of the districts. A light snow fell, which soon turned into a heavy down pour of rain, and this aided materially in keeping the people from the streets. The cars of the company were started out at the regular hour and were run throughout the day without being molested.

Sues Union Pacific for Millions.

Salt Lake Feb. 9.—Attorneys representing John R. Kuykendall, administrator of the estate of Charles Durkee, Saturday filed a petition asking for an account from the Harriman lines of all moneys derived from the Pacific roads, the Central, Southern and Union, which were issued thirty-three years ago. About \$55,000,000 is involved in the suit.

Freight Embargo Lifted.

Baltimore, Feb. 9.—Officials of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad stated last night that the freight embargo, which had existed for several weeks, has been lifted and that there is no congestion of freight at any point on the line. Freight is now being accepted from all connections. While there is a great deal of freight being handled, there is little or no delay to its delivery.

Two Deaths From Plague.

Mazatlan, Mex., Feb. 9.—There were two deaths from the plague yesterday. Very satisfactory results are being obtained by the use of the Yersin serum. Most of the patients to whom it is given begin immediately to recover. A number of hotels and boarding houses are closed, owners fearing that in case the plague breaks out in them the buildings will be burned.
