WILL FRONT THE SOUTH

Board Decides Many Details of New Court House.

Conference With the Architect Berlinghof Held on Thursday.

On Thursday the board of supervisors met with architect George A. Berlinghof and went over with him the details of the new court house. This included changes in the floor plans and a number of minor alterations but in the main the plan remains the same as that offered the board by Mr. Berlinghof in the competition. The most important decision reached was that the court house should face the south. There will be an east entrance but the board wisely decided in favor of a south front. Plans were also accepted for a temporary structure for the use of the county officers during the building period as will be noticed in another column. The plans and specifications for this temporary structure are at the auditors office and bids will be received thereon up to and including Feb. 20th. (This does not mean the 19th.) The board seems better pleased than ever with its selection of an architect as it gets better acquainted with Mr. Berlinghof. It will be about three weeks before the plans and specifications for the new building are completed.

GLOBE TROTTER VISITS DENISON

Bainbridge, the King of Tramps Gives Recital Here Monday

Interesting Character Who Has Walked all Over the World Finds Journey Incomplete Without Visit to Denison.

Oliver Bainbridge, M. A., Oxford, author, artist, lecturer, and many other things, is at present in Denison and from a very pleasant interview we are able to furnish the following facts concerning this interesting and celebrated traveler. Some six years and seven months ago he left England penniless to tramp around the world for the purpose of writing and illustrating an extensive work describing his experiences and giving the striking and unique features of each country. Up to the present his travels have reached the tremendous distance of 65,000 miles. 40,000 of which he has tramped. He maintains himself by writing for newspapers, magazines, painting and giving recitals. Throughout his wonderful tour he has collected documentary proof of visits in the shape of letters from the mayor's of each city. He has been received and entertained by the heads of each country and carries many autograph letters from crowned heads and other world notables. His experiences have been tragic and his escapes miraculous. Imprisoned in Russia, shot and arrested as a spy in Turkey; lost in India, shot in New Zealand, shipwrecked on the Tasmanian coast, shot in the Boer war, etc., etc. His credentials from all quarters of the globe emphasize the Pueblo chieftain which says — "His genius needs no flattery."
