Confine Short in His Accounts.

Kansas City, Feb. 27.—A warrant was sworn out for the arrest of Charles L. Conine of this city, national secretary and treasurer of the United Brotherhood of Leather Workers and Harness Makers. Conine is charged with embezzling \$5,675 of the money belonging to the union. Word was received by the union yesterday that Conine was in Minneapolis. A telegram was immediately sent to that city to place him under arrest.

General Gordon Stricken.

Jackson, Miss., Feb. 27.—General John B. Gordon, commander-in-chief of the United Confederate Veterans, was taken violently ill while on board a Queen and Crescent train, en route to this city from Clinton, Miss., last night. It was necessary to remove him from the train on a stretcher and he suffered spells of nausea while being carried to the hotel.

Death of Colonel Rives.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 27.—Colonel Alfred Landon Rives, a distinguished civil engineer, died at 1 o'clock this morning at his home, Castle Hill, in Albemarle county. He was about seventy-one years old and leaves three daughters, the oldest the Princess Troubetzkoy. Colonel Rives was for some years general manager of the Panama Canal company.

South Omaha Markets.

Regarding market conditions during the past week preceding the date of this correspondence, Clay, Robinson, & Co., have furnished your correspondent with the following report and suggestions.

"The receipts of cattle were very liberal for Monday, but the trade was active and steady, and the advance of 15 to 25 cents of last week was fully sustained. The quality of the offerings was very common, but very few really good cattle being here. The supply of butcher stock has decreased materially, which has caused some improvement in the common medium classes of steers. Owing to the fact a large number of feeders desire to market their cattle by March 1st, we anticipate very good runs this week, and cannot reasonably expect any better prices, but at the same time do not expect any serious decline. There is a keen inquiry for -tackers and feeders at strong prices, but the arrivals continue moderate, and there is not much business transacted in this division.

"The receipts of hogs were just fair today, but adverse reports from eastern markets caused a decline of 5 cents. The bulk of the hogs sold from \$6.85 to \$6.95, with a top of \$7.05. The situation looks very strong, and we propose a better market for the latter part of this week.

"There continues to be a very good demand for muttons and fat lambs; in fact, the supply is not equal to the demand at present, and prices are very strong. The receipts contain a great deal of only half-fatted stock, and this class brings very satisfactory prices. The tone to the trade is strong and healthy, and we look for continued good markets the balance of the feeding season.

Banking Houses Swindled.

New York, Feb. 27.—By the arrest of a man who gave his name as Fermín Montero at the pier of a steamer about to sail for New York, says the Herald's correspondent at Panama, it has been revealed that several of the most important banking houses of Santiago, Chile, were swindled out of \$2,000,000 in gold several weeks ago.
