OPENING DAYS ATTRACT LADIES

Millinery Stores Show Beautiful Spring Hats.

Fruits, Flowers and Foliage Flourish in Full Force on Picture Hats.

"Every year the hats are prettier" said a tired but happy Denison lady yesterday after she had made the rounds of the brilliant millinery stores. Hats the most gorgeous and beautiful, soft effects with "champagne" color, which does not look like that delectable but deceitful drink at all, black sparkling jets, perfect garden spots of fruits and flowers, an endless profusion of chiffon these constitute the millinery creations that are charming the ladies of this county at the stores of Denison. The ladies will have little use for sunshades as the shapes are large and flat. Burnt straw is quite the thing in street hats. The season is rich in novelties, the ornaments designed for the new summer hats being endless in variety and most beautiful in workmanship. There are all kinds of flowers, foliage, feather effects, lace straws, and silks. While there are a few high crowned hats to be seen, the general tending is toward wide flat brims, flaring well off the face. There are few birds to be seen on the new straw hats, but almost every kind of fruit and flower is used. The fuchsias are new and attractive, violets roses' apples and cherry blossoms are quite the thing while the large poppies made in deep rich red and purple satin are very rich looking. Wild berries, straw berries, green grapes are used, while even the humble goose berry graces the new creations. The new colors are champagne a soft foamy brown, and musk melon which is well described by its name. Jet is much used and chiffon is an ever present factor. The use of foliage is more pronounced than ever before the entire crowns of many hats being composed of beautiful leaves.

The Denison millinery openings have been and are being the most successful in years. Added competition seems to have added but new zest to both buyers and dealers, and the knowledge that Denison presents so many attractive displays is drawing trade from an ever widening territory.

The millinery department of the Balle-Brodersen establishment presents an animated scene, extra sales ladies have been employed, and in the carpet room of the big store, Mrs. Silletto who is such an indispensable feature in nearly all of Denison social functions, presides with charming grace over most excellent coffee. Ladies by the half dozen are trying on hats at the same time and little screams of delight mingle with the "Ohs" and "Ahs" of admiration. Miss Schumaker, the presiding genius, looks happy, but tired to death.

The Bamford store is the new feature of Denison's millinery trade and their display is outdone by none. There are the same general effect, with endless variety of detail. "The Boys" have their "Opening" to-day, a visit to their store yesterday found a group of busy milliners putting the finishing touches on a multitude of beautiful hats, while the shelves were filled with seductive creations that peeped out from their tissue paper covers, and like girls in curl papers gave promise of the beauties to come. Death Of Mrs. Hamlin.

On yesterday morning at 10 o'clock occurred the funeral of Mrs. E. E. Hamlin nee McMahon, of Chicago. The funeral occurred at St. Rose of Lima church Rev. Father M. J. Farrelly officiating. The funeral was attended by a large number of sorrowing friends and relatives.

Mrs. Hamlin, better known in this county as Nellie McMahon, was in her 44th year at the time of her death. She came to this county with her parents in 1876 and was well known both in Denison and in the vicinity. In 1881 she was married to Mr. E. E. Hamlin and they resided in Odebolt, Iowa until six years ago when they moved to Chicago. Mrs. Hamlin was in Denison but two months ago as a guest of her relatives and of Mrs. T. C. McCarthy. She was at that time apparently in the best of health. It was not known here that she was ill until on Tuesday came the news of her death and the statement that the remains would be brought here for interment. The funeral party arrived here on Wednesday morning and the remains were taken to the home of Mr. T. C. McCarthy from whose residence the body was taken to the church.

Mrs. Hamlin died on Monday, March 23rd of congestion of the lungs. She leaves her husband, Mr. E. E. Hamlin of Chicago, her mother, Mrs. Margaret McMahon, a brother, Michael McMahon, both of this county and a sister Mrs. J. Kline of Chicago. Mr. Joseph McKinney Auditor for the American Express Co. at Omaha and his wife, Mr. and Mrs. J. Kline and daughter of Chicago and the bereaved husband were among those from out of town to attend the funeral. Mrs. Hamlin will be remembered by many here as a bright, industrious and attractive young woman and many are they who will extend their heartfelt sympathy to the bereaved ones in their hour of sorrow.


