

FIRST NATIONAL BUYS A SAFE

The Latest Burglar Proof Safe to be Placed in Vault.

Said to be Proof Against all Drills, Dynamite, Nitro Glycerine, and all Burglar Tools.

Mr. W. A. McHenry, while in Omaha this week purchased for the First National Bank of Denison one of the new, Maganese Steel Safes, manufactured by Hubbard Rodman-Ely Co. of New York. This safe represents the most modern ideas in safe making and is as far ahead of the present safe as that was of the tin box of our forefathers. The new safe will weigh over 5000 pounds and the cost will exceed \$1600.00. It is so close fitting in its parts that when the door is closed it is impossible to see the crack or to tell which is door and which is safe. Numerous tests show that the metal cannot be drilled into and that to blow it open it would be necessary to use such a quantity of explosive that the whole building would be wrecked but a good chance at instant death. The new safe will soon be installed and the officers and depositors can sleep with the blissful assurance that if the bank is robbed they will at least hear the report of it at the time.

Little Gus Kuhlman Hurt.

Last Monday, little Gus, the nine year old son of Henry Kuhlman, met with an accident that might easily have proven fatal. He was playing in the barn, and in some way aroused the anger or the fear of one of the horses which kicked at him, striking him square in the face. The little fellow was picked up and taken to the house, where it was at once seen that the wounds received were serious. A messenger was dispatched to Charter Oak for a surgeon, and in a very short time Dr. McWilliams was at the little sufferer's bedside.

He found the boy wholly unconscious. An examination showed a fracture in the outer plate of the skull a short distance above the left eye, where the brain is doubly protected. There was a slight depression, but not enough to warrant a belief that the inner plate was injured or that the wound would prove fatal, though it was very serious.

No complications have arisen thus far to impede the boy's recovery, and it is fair to believe he will be as lively as ever. It was a close call, and his face will be a little disfigured, but he can thank his lucky stars it was no worse. Charter Oak Times.
