## LIBRARY PLANS ARE ACCEPTED

Advertisement for Bibs to be Made Soon.

Bids Will Close April 24th. The Cost of Building Complete Will be Within the \$10,000 Limit.

The library board met on yesterday morning and accepted the plans and specifications for the Denison Carnegie Library as read by architect Schoentgen, of Council Bluffs.

Copies of the specifications and drawings will be in the possession of secretary Prof. H. H. Savage, within a few days. Advertisements for bids will be published thereupon and the board has fixed April 24 as the day on which the bids are to be opened. It was decided not to limit the completion to local contractors and the field is open without prejudice. The time in which the building will be completed will also be a factor in the bidding.

The full board was present and the plans were carefully discussed. The heating plant contract will be let separately, but all else will be included in the main contract. Mr. Schoentgen, who is a member of the Iowa Capitol Commission, has done splendid work for the library trustees and has procured estimates of cost, so that the trustees are assured that the building can be built, ready for occupancy well under the limit of Mr. Carnegie's handsome gift of \$10,000.

### CHRISTIAN SCIENCE DEATHS.

What is Shown by Investigating Policy Holders of Insurance.

An editorial in the Boston Traveller calls attention to a low death among the adherents of Christian Science in the following words:

The gathering of Christian Scientists, held in this city, has attracted renewed attention to this rapidly growing and tremendously powerful religious organization, and anything of interest concerning it and its claims, undertakings and accomplishments is read with widespread attention. As almost every one knows, the devotees of Christian Science claim that consistent, faithful practice of the principles of the faith results in an extraordinary degree of bodily good health, and there are certainly many living examples among the sect of the power of the belief as manifested in practical results.

Especially noteworthy, as an illustration of the power of Christian Science, is the deathrate among the members of the mother church in the last year. In a total membership of 27,900 the death rate has been only 2.83 per 1,000. This is a remarkable showing when we consider that for last year the death rate in Boston was 19.7 per 1,000 and that the actual death rate among the policy holders of the leading life insurance companies is from 8 to 20 per 1,000.

This astonishingly low death rate among Science followers becomes still more phenomenal when it is realized that many of the converts to the faith became so when in ill health. These figures are likely to lead thinking people who have not given Christian Science special consideration to a study of the subject from its practical, health-giving aspect.

### EXAMINATION FOR CADET.

Judge Conner Announces Competition to be Held in Denison April 11.

Notice is hereby given that a vacancy now exists in the United States Naval Academy for a midshipman from the TENTH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT of the State of Iowa, and that a competitive examination will be held at the CITY HALL in the CITY of DENISON, Crawford County, Iowa, on the 11th day of April, A. D. 1903, by a committee selected for that purpose.

The qualifications for admission and the only rules under which a candidate will be considered eligible for appointment under the present law are as follows:

The candidate must be not less than FIFTEEN or over TWENTY years of age. He must not be deformed or afflicted with any disease or infirmity which would render him unfit for military service. He must not be less than FIVE FEET in height and must be unmarried.

The examination will include questions in Reading, Writing, Spelling, Arithmetic, Algebra, English Grammar, English Composition, Geography, Physiology, Literature, History, Geography and Hygiene.

The purpose of this preliminary examination is merely to ascertain the mental equipment of the young men of the District who may desire to appear as candidates for appointment, and that the selection of a principal and three alternates may be more easily made. Young men living in the District who are eligible may present themselves for examination at the time and place indicated. Those who have already announced their desire to be admitted will take due notice of the time and place of the examination.
