The Charter Oak Times tells us that Rev. Amstein is about to start for a three months trip to Germany. We wish him bon voyage.


Solo Palmer Toilet Waters at Denison Drug Co.



## A New Mail Route.

It has now been practically determined that Denison is to have at least one additional mail route. No new territory is to be occupied so that our neighboring towns need have no fear of encroachment, but it is proposed to give better service to the farmers within the territory now occupied. It is exasperating to farmers to know that their neighbors receive their mail while they are obliged to go several miles. It is sought to remedy this state of things as far as possible, although after doing the best possible there will doubtless be some who will not enjoy the benefits of the service.

The establishment of rural routes decreases rather than increases the income of the local post-office. Instead of renting a post-office box and paying \$1.00 to the government the rural patron buys a mail box of private parties, pays no rent and so far as postal receipts are concerned the local office is always the loser. The service is much more satisfactory however, and the sphere of influence of the town is increased. These latter considerations make us rejoice at every extension of the rural service out of Denison.
