## NEW ROUTES FOR CRAWFORD

Denison, Buck Grove and Manilla Get Service.

Route Six Out of Denison Will Cover Additional Territory Northwest of the City.

The prospects are that three new rural routes will be established in Crawford county this summer. This will bring the total to eighteen routes covering different portions of the county, as follows:

Breda route covering north Jackson, township; Two West Side routes in West Side, Hays and Jackson townships; Two Vail routes, lying in Milford, West Side, Hays and East Boyer townships; Six Denison routes lying in Otto Creek, Hanover, Goodrich, Paradise, Milford, Denison, East Boyer, Nishnabotny, Washington and Paradise townships; Two Dow City routes lying in Union, Boyer, Denison and Paradise townships; One Buck Grove route, lying in Washington and Union townships; One Manilla route, lying in Nishnabotny, Iowa and Hays townships; Two Charter Oak routes, lying in Charter Oak, Hanover, Soldier and Willow townships; Two Kiron routes, lying in Stockholm, Otto Creek, Milford and Morgan townships.

Despite this extensive service, there will still be many farmers "off the route", but it would seem that this cannot be entirely remedied until either the county becomes more thickly settled, or a house to house delivery is established.

Special examiner L. A. Thompson, of Council Bluffs left Denison on Monday evening, after a week of strenuous work in examining the old routes, looking up proposed changes and establishing Route 6 out of Denison.

The special examiner is the sole referee as to route changes, and the postmaster cannot make any alteration in a route as laid down by the department. While the inspector examined a number of proposed changes and drove a total of perhaps 200 miles during his week in Denison, he left no notice of his intentions and the notification of changes if any, will come through the department.

It is possible that the southern portion of route 2 will be given to the Manilla route, in which event changes will probably be made to accommodate additional patrons living closer to Denison. A slight change has been asked in Route 1, Route 3 may be shortened and the extreme southern portion of the route served from Buck Grove hereafter.

Route 4 will stand practically as at present although a change has been asked where duplicate service is given from Dow City. Route 5 will be changed but the patrons will be served from Route 6.

By an order received from the department yesterday, the rural carriers will hereafter leave the Denison office at 8:30 a. m., returning as near 4:30 p. m. as possible.

On Monday Mr. Thompson held a civil service examination at which five candidates for the new route were examined. The result has not been made known. Others who passed successful examinations will be placed on the eligible register and will be in line for appointment should a vacancy occur on any of the routes.

The Buck Grove Route will probably be laid out to the south of that town, while the Manilla route will run to the north and east.

Mr. Thompson made many friends while in Denison. He listens courteously to all complaints and suggestions, made most careful inspection of the proposed routes and changes, and showed himself to be a thorough business man. His visit was enjoyed by all connected with the service at this place, and it is their hopes that he may come again.
