KIDNAP NONUNION FIREMEN.

Workmen Raid Vessel and Carry Off Strike Breakers.

Chicago, April 13.—Three masked men held up a street car near Garfield park in this city at an early hour today and robbed seven passengers, the conductor and motorman of about \$100, a gold watch and some jewelry. The highwaymen boarded the car near Sacramento avenue. One kept guard on the front platform, one on the rear, while the third entered the car and at the point of a revolver forced the occupants to give up their valuables. The only woman on the car fell on her knees, praying for mercy, but without avail.

Latter Day Saints Gain Converts. Kansas City, April 13.—Joseph Smith, president of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, preached an Easter sermon at the church at Independence. Several hundred persons were unable to gain admittance, and an overflow meeting was held. It was the greatest religious meeting since the beginning of the conference. Later many persons were baptised and confirmed as members of the church. The confirmation service consists of laying on of hands for the gift of the holy spirit. Herman C. Smith of Lamoni, Ia., delivered an address.

Landslide at Aspen Tunnel. Evanston, Wyo., April 13.—A landslide occurred at the east end of the Aspen tunnel, burying the Union Pacific tracks twenty feet deep for a distance of 200 or 300 feet, and causing a cave-in at the end of the tunnel. No one was killed as far as known. The eastbound passenger train had just passed through the tunnel and barely missed the slide. The tracks may not be cleared for twenty-four hours.

More Charges Against Postal Ring. Washington, April 13.—Postoffice inspectors engaged in the investigation of department affairs will make a careful inquiry into the charges that certain wagon manufacturers have been given preference in advance information about the establishment of rural free delivery routes. Those charges come from a firm in Peoria.
