It is said that in the East women are dying of exhaustion in "society." A woman loafer who overworks herself in "society" is no great loss to the world.



The enterprising business men of Webster City are trying hard to secure the T. E. Brown skate factory for that place. The Freeman-Tribune says: A subscription paper for shares has been made out and the Commercial League committee expect to-day or tomorrow, with the aid of Mr. Brown, to circulate the petition and secure the sale of necessary amount of stock. Mr. Brown expects to capitalize the company at \$50,000 of which amount he will put upon the market \$12,500, reserving for himself \$37,500 of the stock, much of the necessary machinery of the plant is now stored in Anamosa, having been shipped from Mr. Brown's temporary Chicago factory. Plans for the concern are not yet far enough along so that the location of the factory buildings has been selected. As Mr. Brown's skate, however, is the only one of its kind in the United States and is protected by patents it is expected that the factory will assume large proportions.
