PLANS ARE MATURING.

Arrangements For The Reception of Roosevelt's Visit.

THE LINE OF MARCH ARRANGED

Committees are Appointed to Assist Those Already Working. A Big Time All Day.

The arrangements for the receiving of President Roosevelt are now well under way. A meeting of the different committees has been held, and new committees have been added. We understand sufficient money is now in hand for the carrying out of all details and people from all over Crawford county will not only see the President, but will have a big time the entire day. The President's train is scheduled to arrive in Denison about six o'clock a. m. This does not indicate that the President will put in an appearance at that time, however, he will need rest, and will not be disturbed until 8:30. At this hour the reception committee will be at the Illinois Central depot to receive the distinguished party and the line of march will be taken up.

The line of march as outlined will start from the Central depot and go to Mr. Gronau's residence, then east to Solomon's, down to the Shaw corner, west to the Baptist church, north to Broadway, west to Main street, north on Main to Tremont and west to the speakers stand near the Noraandy hotel. There are twenty-five persons in the presidential party aside from the President and his secretary, and carriages for all have been arranged. It has not been decided fully as to the make-up of the carriage list; this will be announced later.

The state militia, Company M. of Sac City, will be here to act as a body guard, and the old soldiers of the county will act as an escort.

The entertainment committee to furnish amusement after the president has departed, will join with the colleges of Northwestern Iowa in field and other amusements. As June 2nd, is the regular college field meet, this plan was adopted, so as not to in any way conflict with them. The college sports will include hurdle races, foot races, pole vaulting, shot putting, ball games. Some very liberal prizes will be offered for free-for-all foot races.

Your father and mother are prostrated over what has occurred and at your absence. If you see these lines, come home; you can surrender to any of the officers and you will be protected. The fact that Mr. Baker is rapidly improving and has every hope of recovery lead many to think that the boy will return. Mr Baker's condition is much improved and no serious complications are anticipated.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

City Council Prepares Statement of City Finances.

In another column will be found a financial statement of the city for the year ending April 7th. The expense of running the city of Denison this last year amounts to \$16,781.48. This includes money that has been applied toward payment of debt.

The income for the year amounts about \$1000.00 more than the amount paid out. The statement is published in compliance with a new law requiring a statement each year.

The council is to be congratulated upon having reduced the city debt nearly \$7500 in so short a time, in the taking up of time warrants, interest and bonds. There may be those who think work in different parts of the city should be done, yet when the fact that the city is really getting out of debt, is brought to light, they cannot but commend the action of the council. When once this debt is cut down to a reasonable sum, improvements will be pushed.

FILE ON HOMESTEADS.

A Delegation of Denison Land Seekers to Dakota.

THEY FILE ON EIGHT CLAIMS.

D. F. Brown Conducts Successful Excursion to Pierre South Dakota, Mayor Carey Among Them.

D. F. Brown and party of land seekers have returned from Pierre, S. D. and are now telling every one of the many merits of that section of the country. Among those who took out homesteads are D. F. Brown, William Flaherty, Tom Curry, Charley Tucker, Sam Jones, Asa Brown, and Miss Angie Brown. Mr. Carey did not take up a homestead but bought a tract of land near Pierre.

Pierre is the capital of South Dakota on the Missouri river in the center of the state. The land across the river is the homestead land and was opened last June for settlement, 30 miles or more have been settled since that time leaving 45 miles to be settled which will soon be taken. The decided prairie land east of the river sells from \$8 to \$12, the soil is a deep black loam without stone or gravel. Two large ferry boats and four gasoline passenger boats are constantly carrying passengers and teams across the river or are employed in taking excursionists up the river five miles above Pierre to see a herd of Buffalo owned by Scott Phillips. Pierre has a population of four thousand, its lights and machinery are run by natural gas, and fair indications are that in the near future Pierre will be a great manufacturing place as they have the river and advantages of natural gas. All the above parties are well pleased with the country and think it has a great future. The water especially is first class although this country. There is no malaria bottom on the river, and while it is bluffy near the river, back of this is nicely rolling prairie.

Prof. W. C. Van Ness Still at the Head of The College.

A sufficient sum has been guaranteed to insure a competent corps of instructors and assistants, and the prospects for the future of the college are very bright.

The directors have ordered the buildings be repainted and repaired and the main building thoroughly renovated.


