DENISON WINS SECOND PLACE

Buena Vista Wins First in the Oratorical Contest of Tuesday Afternoon.

Yesterday morning at the Opera House the eight annual Contest of the Northwestern Iowa Oratorical Association, was fought to a finish. Mr. Glen Lyman won first place for Buena Vista on an oration that would do credit to any university in Iowa and Geo. Newcom was so close a second that figuratively they were neck and neck under the wire. Many thought that Denison's champion should have had first place but we think that all were well satisfied with the decision of the judges. It has been so few times that Buena Vista has not won first in these contests that we have really lost count but this does not detract from their glory.

In the estimation of many Mr. Newcom should have had first place but Denison is more the less proud of her orator that he did not succeed in capturing that place.

In our own eyes he was far away in the lead of all the others in delivery, in fact he was splendid, and D. N. C. is justly proud of him.

The crowd was a little late in getting to the hall but when they came the hall was rapidly filled to overflowing. There was not much cheering done nor enthusiasm displayed in the early part owing to a lack of organization of rosters on one or two of the sides but when the orations were done and while the judges were preparing their decision pandemonium broke loose and the cheers were many and hearty. The contest this year was an especial success in that there was no fighting and ill feeling shown, in fact there was a manifest good fellowship among the different schools and we think this a distinction for Denison and her college.

Next year the contest will be held at Le Mars and as good a contest is contemplated as was held here yesterday. The music given at intervals during the contest was Denison's best and need we say more for we all know that Denison music is the best.

Comfort and sister of Mrs. Morris McHenry and Mrs. Bruner and came with the family from Illinois to Harris Grove in Harrison County this state. Soon thereafter Mr. Comfort with his family came to Crawford County and located on the tract of land two miles west of where Dow City is located, making about 48 years that Mrs. Woodruff has lived in Crawford County. She was a member of the Comfort family who had such a large share in the development and upbuilding of the county. She was widely known and held in high esteem as all the members of that family have been. Mrs. Woodruff has suffered much for several years. She had the services of skilled physicians and surgeons but all that was done failed to cure. She peacefully passed away about noon-time last Wednesday. The funeral services were held at the Methodist church Dow City, Rev. E. E. Goodrich conducting the services, notwithstanding the downpour of rain nearly all day the church was well filled, many of the old friends and neighbors being present to show their sympathy with the family in their bereavement. Maud Paine is home from her school duties at Battle Creek.


Miss Ransa Taylor returned last week from Henderson, Ia. where she has been teaching the past year.
