Children's Day.

Children's Day exercises were held at the Methodist church on Sunday evening. Quite an elaborate program had been prepared and the services had been announced a half hour earlier in order to give the children plenty of time. In spite of the rain, a large number attended the services, but some of the children were detained at home, which cut the program somewhat short. The church was beautifully decorated for the occasion; the pulpit and altar being one solid bank of flowers and house plants. The first number on the program was an anthem by the choir which was well rendered. After this the services were turned over to the children and consisted of songs, recitations and exercises appropriate for the occasion. The program had been prepared under the special direction of Mrs. Gulick, Mrs. Voss, Mrs. J. B. Romans, and Miss Beatrice Kirkup. One of the best numbers of the evening was a vocal solo by Miss Junia Romans. Junia has a very beautiful voice and gives promise before many years of becoming an artist in that line. One important feature of the program was the annual collection. The money received from these collections goes into the Sunday School children's fund and is used by the church to aid deserving young men and women in getting a college education. Dr. Miller, who has been for many years a member of the committee on education in the Des Moines conference, which has charge of loaning money to students, made a brief address before the collection was taken, and from his own personal knowledge pointed out many cases of persons who would never have attained

a college education had it not been for assistance from this fund and who turned out to be useful men and women both in the service of the church and in private life. The eloquent appeal of the pastor brought out a liberal response from the audience.
