The Method of Electing a Pope.

Register Leader: Cardinal Oreglia, camerlingo or papal chamberlain by virtue of his office acting pope during the interregnum between the death of a pope and the election of his successor, has created great scandal in Rome by ostentatiously, while the breath still lingers in the frail body of Leo, setting about preparing for the anticipated conclave. It is not considered good form to direct attention so publicly to the fact that the pontifical shoes are likely soon to be vacant, and the camerlingo is being much criticized for what is deemed his indecent haste. It would hardly be comforting to the dying pope if he could hear the hammers at work on the booths or cells which are to confine the members of the sacred electoral college when they are filling his place. The pope, who is officially simply the bishop of Rome, was originally selected by the entire body of the people constituting the church at Rome. Gradually, largely through the lawless turbulence of the laity, the clergy was allowed to seize the exclusive power of election. The next step was to give the privilege of a vote only to cardinals. But in mediaeval days much scandal attached to the way the cardinals exercised their high privilege, and the council of Lyons, in 1274, adopted, as to the method of election, rules and regulations designed to prevent simony, outside interference and other abuses. The system then established is substantially now in existence. The first nine days after the death of a pope are occupied with devotional exercises for the eternal repose of the soul of the deceased pontiff. On the ninth day occur his obsequies, and on the tenth the cardinals assemble in the famous Sistine chapel. After the celebration of mass a committee of the cardinals gives audience to the foreign envoys. After this ceremony the conclave proper begins by a double locking of the doors communicating with the outside world, doors which are to be kept closed until an election is accomplished. The cardinals retire each to a small wooden cell and are compelled to remain therein, except twice a day when the sacred college meets to ballot. An election can be effected in two ways—either by acclamation or adoration, or by balloting. The latter method is almost always used, the first being available only when some person is considered by all pre-eminently fit. Food is passed to the imprisoned cardinals through a casement, and the rules require that it be small in quantity and limited in variety. When the college comes together at 6 a. m., each cardinal affixes his Latimotto to a ballot, writes the name of his favorite, and folds and seals the ballot so that, while the candidate's name may be read, his own identification mark is concealed. To elect, a two-thirds vote plus one is necessary, the successful candidate's own vote being subtracted. If there is no choice, the cardinals retire again to their cells until 2 p. m. They then assemble, and this time the name of the candidate who received the largest vote at the morning balloting is submitted, and the cardinals vote yes or no on whether or not they accede to his election. Again a two-thirds vote plus one is requisite. After each voting the ballots are collected together, are burned in a brazier with damp straw, the dense smoke of which issues from a particular chimney, and proclaims to the outside world that no election has occurred. The second day there is the same procedure as on the first, and the process continues until some one is elected. As soon as a two-thirds vote is obtained, the fact is announced. The elect, if he accepts, immediately chooses the name by which he is to be known, and receives the homage of all present. He is next clad in the vestments and insignia of the papal office and receives homage a second time. Thereupon the first in the order of cardinal deacons goes to a balcony and proclaims the name of the new pope. The final ballots are not destroyed, but opened and their identification marks scanned. It is thus known how each cardinal voted on the decisive ballot. In the old days, when much depended on the favor of the

pontiff, the fact that the newly elected pope would learn the name of his opponents was often a determining factor when the voting was close, and induced waverers to rally to a candidate who appeared to have a good prospect of success. Thus it was that even in the sacred precincts of the cardinal college, within the closed doors of the sacred conclave, the bandwagon rumbled along and possessed the attractiveness it now holds out to the American politician. It will be observed, however, from the elaborate precautions surrounding a papal election, that everything the wit of man can devise has been provided to preserve the choice free from intrigue, individual selfishness and all unseemliness. The oath taken by each cardinal as he casts his ballot is: "I call to witness Christ our Lord, who shall be my judge, that I am electing him who before God I think ought to be elected."

WOULD TAKE PLUNDER.

Base Ball Players on Way to Canada With Property of Club. (Belle Plaine Union.)

A search warrant was issued by Mayor Milner Tuesday afternoon on the order of the Baseball association to be served on players Klock, Gilmore and Alberts, who were about to leave town, in order to find a catcher's mitt and a player's suit which had been missing since Sunday. Gilmore was on the way north which goes north at 4 o'clock on his way to Mason City, where he was to be joined Wednesday morning by Klock and Alberts, when Marshall Blair arrived. After searching the suit case which was his only baggage, and the caboose, Gilmore was allowed to go on his way. Marshall Blair found Alberts at the train and together they went to the apartments over Swallum's drug store occupied by the three men. Here two valises were searched and a base ball cap was found. Alberts claimed to be innocent and said that he did not know the cap was there. He also told of a trunk at the depot already checked for Regina, Canada, where he and Klock were to join a ball team. At the depot a new trunk was found tied up in about forty feet of clothes-line rope. This was the one purchased jointly by the three men a short time ago of the Ady & Shaw Clothing Co. After having some trouble in opening it Marshall Blair commenced his search. The catcher's glove was the first missing article found and was later positively identified by F. H. Henry and H. U. Swallum as belonging to the association. Other articles found in the trunk were a towel, a pair of gloves and an over coat belonging to H. U. Swallum and an old Belle Plaine uniform, not the one for which the search was made. Klock had appeared on the scene by this time and both he and Alberts persistently claimed that they did not know how the goods got into the trunk. The boys were taken before Mayor Milner later in the evening and a lecture giving some very good advice was administered. They were fined and discharged.
