TO VISIT IRELAND.

Mr. P. E. C. Lally leaves on next Sunday over the I. C. R. R. to spend his vacation in the land of his birth. He goes to revisit the scenes of his childhood, to visit his only sister still residing in the old home, to fix and place a monument over the grave of his dead mother and then spend thirty days sight seeing, visiting the places of principal interest in Ireland. There is scarcely a point of interest made famous by Irish Poets "From the center all around the sea," in his native land that he will not visit before he returns.

There is a big satisfaction to Mr. Lally in visiting Ireland at this time, the new Irish Land Bill has just passed the House of Commons and will, undoubtedly, pass the House of Lords; this is evidence that the English have at last recognized the justice of the Irish cause. A cause to which Mr. Lally has devoted lots of his time and quite a considerable of his money during the past twenty-five years. He will spend some time in London and visit Dillon, Redmond and others while Parliament is in session; will spend some little time in Scotland and a few days in Paris before his return.

MRS HODGE CONFESSES

Gives Herself Up To Authorities in Michigan.

ADMITS SHE KILLED RYAN

But, She Declares, He Attempted to Assault Her—Says she was Traveling With Him.

Grand Rapids, Mich. July 26—A young woman giving the name of Mrs. Aurora Hodge, her age 19 and her home Denison, Io., entered the office of Superintendent of Police Carr today and said she wanted to give herself up, declaring that she had killed a man near Salt Lake City, Utah on July 11 last. She said she had parted from her husband a few months after their marriage, and went with a traveling medicine vender as his book-keeper.

"When on a lonely road near Salt Lake City July 11," she said, "he attempted to assault me and I shot him with a revolver I had been carrying. I left him in the wagon and went to Salt Lake City to give myself up, but my nerve failed me and I took a train for Denison. I told my brother, and when he went to tell the authorities I fled to Chicago. There I secured a position as waitress in a Spring Lake, Mich., hotel, but could not rest with it on my mind, so I came to Grand Rapids to give myself up."

Mrs. Hodge refused to tell the name of the man she killed. Chief Carr is investigating, and the woman is in jail.

A telegram late tonight from Acting Chief of Police Burbridge, of Salt Lake City, to Chief Carr confirms Mrs. Hodge's story that there is a warrant for her arrest for murder, and asks that she be held for the Salt Lake authorities.

Salt Lake City, July 26—The crime with which Mrs. Hodge is charged was the murder of William Ryan, a traveling spectacle peddler, in a canyon south of this city some weeks ago. The object of the murder is supposed to have been robbery, as Ryan was known to carry considerable money. When the body was found the arms and legs were tightly bound. The head had been crushed with some blunt instrument.

The police of this city have suspected that Mrs. Hodge was connected with the crime, and a few days ago issued a warrant for her arrest and sent it to Denison, Iowa, for service.

Mrs. Hodge referred to in the above telegram, is a sister of Mr. Alfred Larson manager of the Iowa Telephone Co. She is quite well known in Denison, having spent her younger days here. It will be remembered that about five years ago she disappeared from this place, dressed as a boy. Since that time she has travelled all over the United States, securing employment as an expert waitress in the leading hotels of the country. At El Pass she was married to a Mr. Hodge and, after living together a short time they were divorced. For a short time prior to her coming to Denison she claimed to be employed by a spectacle vender as book keeper. Her brother Mr. Alfred Larson had been expecting a visit from his sister and had sent her a ticket and money to Ogden, Utah. Failing to get the same at the time she expected it Mrs. Hodge went to Salt Lake and came home.

For the past two weeks she has been assisting her brother in the telephone office. On the 20th the Review received a telegram from Salt Lake, asking that an interview be sent to the Tribune.

This was the first news to Mr. Larson that there was anything wrong; or that Mrs. Hodge was wanted at Salt Lake, and to this day he is not in full possession of the facts. While he was in the country in the interest of his company a second telegram was received and Mrs. Hodge was interviewed, and while seemingly considerably agitated said nothing that would implicate her. Since her surrender, however it is said that she had made virtually the same statements in Denison as she does in Grand Rapids and that the shooting was in defense of honor.

The police of the city had received a telegram to watch her movements, and this was done until Thursday night when she disappeared and was not heard from until the news of her confession came out in the dailies.

She will be taken back to Salt Lake for trial and the case will be watched with considerable interest.
