**FANCY WORK**

A spectacle case for wee fingers to make is as follows: Use old kid gloves or cham. ois, taking for a pattern an old spectacle case. Cut two pieces of card board the size of it; cover them on inside with p'ush, whip together. Now cut outside from the kid about 1/2 inch larger than the case, pink around; begin at one corner and cut slots evenly apart in both pieces. Now outline a face and the words.

In a case on the front piece laced together. With cords or ribbon to hang up by.

A cunning set of pin cushions is called the pansy set made from scraps of silk, satin and velvet, the latter makes the prettiest, as they look more natural. Use white, yellow and lavender, placing pins from the lightest on the white and yellow, and the darker shades on the lavender.

Take a piece of card board, cut in pansy shape; cover one side with wadding, a little satchet powder and material for pansy. For the other side take plain lining to match the outside. Should have some long stitches of silk in center like the marking of panacea, whip together with silk of same shade. Now suspend each with baby ribbon shade of each pansy; hide ends under rosette of all colors used.

August 10th, Sleepers will run on the Illinois Central, the Rock Island G. A. R. Special Train, via the Scenic Route.

August 12th, Sleepers will run via the Union Pacific to Salt Lake City, thence on the Southern Pacific.
