## FANCY WORK

A pretty sofa pillow is made of black velvet with white, made as follows: On it use arasene leaves and one knot of green zephyr. For snow balls, take embroidery hoops and stretch a small piece of cheese cloth in, then draw circle the size of a small tumbler. Work across with the zephyr until perfectly covered. Now commence an outer edge with needle thread with white arasene from the back of the work to the surface; put it down close to where it came up; put through to back leaving a loop 1/4 to an inch on the right side. Repeat this until solidly covered, now cut out circle leaving about 1/2 inch with which to turn in and gather up, placing cotton sufficient to give it the proper raise; now sew to cushion and work loops of arasene to hide stitches. This will give green at base. They can be cleaned in flour, working stems and leaves in arasene, drawing design on velvet with chalk.
