Largely Attended Convention on Friday Last.

The convention was called to order by County Chairman W. M. McLennan at 11:30 a. m. who called C. C. Walters to the chair as temporary chairman, and T. P. Black, of Dow City, as temporary secretary.

On motion the chair was instructed to appoint three committees, on resolutions, on credentials, and on permanent organization. The chair appointed the following:

### AFTERNOON SESSION

At 1:30 the convention reassembled at the opera house, and was called to order.

Committee on permanent organization recommended that Honorable J. P. Conner act as permanent chairman, and Messrs. T. P. Black and Will Schouten as permanent secretaries.

Committee on resolutions reported and report was adopted.

Committee on Credentials reported all townships represented except Morgan and Soldier townships.

Mr. Conner on assuming the chair made an impromptu speech dwelling upon and partly replying at some length to the misrepresentations made by the democratic candidate, J. B. Sullivan, relative to the attitude of the Iowa delegation toward the Fowler bill.

The first office to be filled was that of representative, and motion was made that convention proceed by informal ballot. There being no particular candidate for the office there were a number of gentlemen brought out, among them being C. L. Voss, Chas. Tabor, P. D. McMahon, Fred Herre, Dr. B. F. Darling and John Bayles. On the informal ballot Dr. Darling was declared the nominee.

For County Treasurer, the name of Mr. John Rohwer was presented, and he was the unanimous choice of the convention.

For Sheriff Mr. W. J. McAhren received a majority of votes cast on the informal ballot and on motion the rules were suspended and the informal ballot declared formal, and Mr. McAhren was declared the nominee of the convention.

For Superintendent Prof. W. C. Von Coeln was the unanimous choice of the convention.

There was no contest for the surveyor's office, and Uncle Morris McHenry was chosen as the nominee.

For Coroner there were two candidates, Dr. Waterhouse of Charter Oak, and Dr. Evans of Arion. On the formal ballot Dr. Evans was declared the nominee.

For Supervisor to succeed Mr. Schroeder, Mr. Chas. Schmidt, of Otter Creek township was chosen.

For supervisor to succeed Mr. Molter Mr. Jacob Bills, of Washington township was declared the nominee of the convention.

On motion convention adjourned.

### THE RESOLUTIONS.

Be it resolved by the Republicans of Crawford County, Iowa, in delegate convention assembled that we most heartily endorse the political record of President Roosevelt, Secretary Shaw, Senator Doliver, Gov. ## A POPULAR PRELATE.

Mgr. Thomas J. Conaty, Bishop of Los Angeles.

Mgr. James J. Conaty, bishop of Los Angeles, who since his elevation to the episcopal chair a few months ago has become immensely popular in his diocese, is a noted educator and scholar and one of the best known prelates of the Roman Catholic hierarchy of the United States.

Bishop Conaty succeeded Rev. Dr. Keane as rector of the Catholic university at Washington in 1896, retaining that position until named for the see of Los Angeles. He was one of the organizing spirits of the Catholic Summer school at Plattsburg, N. Y., and was its president from 1893 to 1897. He was made a domestic prelate to the pope by the late Leo XIII. and has been otherwise honored by the church. Two years ago he was consecrated titular bishop of Samos by Cardinal Gibbons at Baltimore. This honor was in recognition of his labors in behalf of Cath-

olic education. The title of bishop of Samos is entirely honorary, the see of Samos, from which the title is derived, having been extinct for many generations.


Bishop Conaty is a native of Ireland and is fifty-six years old. His parents were of good families and noted for their intellectual attainments. Shortly after his birth the family came to this country and established a home in Massachusetts. The future bishop was educated in Holy Cross college, Worcester, Mass., and St. Joseph's seminary, Troy, N. Y. After finishing his theological studies he returned to Worcester, finally becoming rector of the Church of the Sacred Heart, which was erected under his auspices.

A lover of all things American, Bishop Conaty has always endeavored to cultivate among his people a liking for good, broad American citizenship. It is said that he has been a sympathizer with the liberal wing of the church if not an actual member of that body. On the educational question he is a champion of parochial schools and for many years edited a weekly magazine in their favor. In Irish national affairs he has taken a deep interest and in every way has shown a warm feeling for the land of his birth. A strong temperance advocate, he was for two terms president of the Catholic Total Abstinence Union of America. Mgr. Conaty's success in the episcopal chair of Los Angeles is no more than was expected by his friends and associates.

## MONUMENT TO NAVAL HERO

How the Memory of Ensign Worth Bagley is Perpetuated.

The monument to Ensign Worth Bagley, the only line officer of the United States navy to fall in the Spanish war, which was recently unveiled over his grave in Oakwood cemetery, Raleigh, N. C., is of the finest Quincy granite, very dark and rich. Upon the west face of the shaft is a bronze medallion bearing the portrait of Bagley in high relief in uniform and with

cap on head. Enslow in bold letters of bronze is the inscription, "Worth Bagley, 1874-1898."

Worth Bagley, who was an ensign in the United States navy, was the first American officer and the only line officer of the navy to be killed in the Spanish war. He fell on board the United States torpedo boat Winslow during the bombardment of Cardenas, Cuba, May 11, 1898. Ensign Bagley was a native of North Carolina and was appointed to the Naval academy in July, 1889. In July, 1897, he was commissioned ensign, and in less than a year met his death in the performance of his duty.

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
