## MRS. SHAW INTERVIEWED.

Tells of Her Delightful Trip to Europe.

Washington, Sept. 20.—Mrs. Shaw wife of the secretary of the treasury, who has just returned from a three-months' visit to Europe, talks very interestingly of her experiences. Mrs. Shaw was accompanied by her two daughters, Miss Enid and Miss Emma Shaw, and by Miss Mary McClelland and Miss Edmondson of Des Moines. The ladies travelled quietly, without seeking any kind of recognition from the rulers of the various lands they visited. With characteristic simplicity, Mrs. Shaw declined the proffered services of the different ambassadors and ministers to save her luggage from inspection, and she thoroughly enjoyed some of the instances which usually cause most travelers annoyance. Discussing her trip she says:

"I consider my visit a very eventful one and a profitable one to my daughters. For instance, we were in Venice when the new pope was proclaimed, and I was interested in the enthusiasm of the people and of their marked love of their former patriarch. We were in St. Mark's the morning the news came and salvos of 'Viva il papa' could not have been more hearty in Rome. Immediately after the news came the great basilica was placed in the hands of decorators, and the next day a magnificent religious fete was celebrated in thanksgiving. The fine old chimneys at St. Mark's kept up a perpetual concert, and the whole city seemed to go wild with joy.

We went through Belgium, Holland, England, parts of Germany and Switzerland, and France and Italy. I enjoyed my visit to Lucerne and to Interlaken more than anything else. In fact, if Lucerne were nearer home I would spend my summers there. I am as patriotic as most Americans, but I do not agree with those who compare the scenery of the Alps to the Rockies. I consider the road from Lucerne to Interlaken a more magnificent panorama than anything I saw in the Rockies. I was particularly impressed with the shrift manifested among the people in Belgium and Holland I saw old women picking the twigs from the streets and underbrush in the woods. These old people make quite a respectable living selling fagots, and the result of their labors is that the entire country, including the forests, looks like a well kept park.

In Switzerland we visited the rendezvous of William Tell and his companions between Lucerne and Basel. We had an amusing experience with our baggage after leaving Interlaken. Our boat was just steaming off when we saw our trunks and even hand satchels reposing on the shore, although we had been assured that the luggage was aboard. We explained our plight to the captain, and he said that at the first landing we could telephone and have the baggage sent by rail to Geneva but at the next landing we found the telephone out of order, and affairs looked serious.

A young man from Kansas City, whom we had met at Interlaken, got off the boat, taking our checks, to redeem and hurry forward the luggage. When we got to Interlaken the authorities were willing to give him only his own baggage. They said they had no means of knowing that he was honestly in possession of our checks. He was two days engaged in telegraphing and securing identification before he recovered and started our trunks and bags toward us.

Mrs. Shaw will remain in Washington indefinitely. Miss Erma Shaw will probably be entered at a boarding school near Baltimore, and Miss Enid Shaw, who graduated last June at Cornell, Iowa, will be formally introduced to society next winter.

## A WOMAN HUMORIST.

Miss Carolyn Wells, the Writer of Clever "Nonsense."

Carolyn Wells, the writer of popular books, whose quaint conceits in verse and prose have attracted the most favorable notice of both the public and reviewers, is one of the cleverest of the few women who do really humorous work.

Miss Wells is young, attractive and vivacious, interested in many things besides authorship and is somewhat fond of society. She lives with her people at Hawthay, N. J., near enough to New York to enable her to keep in touch with the editors and publishers, with whom her productions are in demand.

The latest work of Miss Wells is a burlesque historical novel entitled "Abenaki Caldwell." In writing this work the author has apparently had a

lot of fun. The average historical novel of the last few years has been abounding in its stilted language and its mock incredible feats. Miss Wells has carried these features to extremes and has jumbled together a plot, containing an adventure in every chapter, that makes an ordinary historical romance seem tame by contrast.

Miss Wells' humor—her quaint way of looking at commonplace things—is a natural gift. Her felicity of phrase has been, of course, in a large measure acquired. The great charm of her work lies in the fact that she is full of surprises. One never knows just what is coming next. She began writing in 1895, contributing to the magazines. Among her most popular works are "At the Sign of the Sphinx," "Folly in the Forest" and an "Anthology of Nonsense Rhymes." Miss Wells works easily and gathers the ideas for her jingles and stories from the most unexpected quarters; consequently she is very prolific. She insists that she is in no sense "literary." Her favorite word in either reading or writing is "nonsense."

## GREEK CHURCH IN RUSSIA.

Famous For Great Wealth and the Beauty of Its Cathedrals.

The average tourist in Russia is likely to be astounded by the number and grandeur of the Greek churches and cathedrals which everywhere abound. In and about Moscow alone there are forty churches, monasteries and convents. Among these the cathedral of Ostankin is notable. It is a marvel of richness.

This cathedral is of white stone, built in the shape of a Greek cross. It has golden cupolas at its corners and a great dome in the center, all of which are covered with copper plated with gold. It took 900 pounds of gold leaf to plate the dome, and it is estimated that there is \$1,000,000 worth of the precious metal upon it. The interior of the cathedral contains marbles and precious stones costing \$2,000,000, and there is \$500,000 worth of sacred pictures within it.

St. Isaac's cathedral, St. Petersburg, cost about \$20,000,000, and its gold dome is as large as that of the capitol at Washington. It took immense quantities

of gold leaf to plate this mighty dome. Many other churches in the empire approach these in costliness and magnificence.


In Russia there are 87,000,000 Greek Catholics and the revenues of the church are enormous. The money flows into its coffers in a steady stream, and the amount in the treasury is almost incomputable. Even the church itself does not know what it has.

The czar is the head of the church. He governs it through the holy synod, which meets at St. Petersburg. Nominally he appoints every officer in the church and can transfer and dismiss officers in many cases. In reality, however, he interferes but little in the church government, leaving everything to the procurator of the holy synod.
