KUEHNLE SPEAKS AT ROLFE.

Talks to the Pythians of that Place, Who had Gathered for a Celebration

On Thursday last there was a reunion or picnic of Pythians held at Rolfe Iowa, and Carl F. Kuehnle, of Denison was invited to deliver an address in conjunction with Grand Chancellor Moolsberry. A correspondence from Rolfe to the Des Moines Leader has the following to say of Mr. Kuehnle's address.

Mr. Kuehnle discussed at some length the nature of the republic, its institution and its guarantee to the people of freedom and the pursuit of happiness. He pointed out that the voice of the people may not be said always to be the voice of God, for we now know the majority not always is right. He said that an ideal republic would be one where there are no limitations but without legal restraint without the protection of the courts liberty would become license, and might would again claim to be the right.

The speaker discussed the distinction between the Jefferson and Hamilton ideas of the best form of the republic's government, saying of late Hamilton's theory of a reasonably centralized government has prevailed. The people realize that the law is our salvation; that where there is respect for its authority there is liberty and true freedom prevails. Our system of government may truly be called the reign of law.

Mr. Kuehnle admitted that as long as human nature is unregenerated there will be wrongs; but the remedy lies in the hand of the people. It is the duty of all good men to take a hand in politics, that if it be corrupt it may be purified.

"These goody goody purists who consider it beneath their dignity to take part in a caucus," he said, "are responsible for the existence of the boss and ward heeler. Were they to vote they would of a certainty be out of a job."

Referring to municipal politics, the speaker said that the people are being taught that public officials are apt to be corrupt and venal; that a city council and a legislature can be bought, and that every man in office can be bought or has his price. This is a dangerous doctrine, he said, and fruitful of much evil. However horrible the situation in Tammany-ized New York, in Chicago, in St. Louis or in Minneapolis, often the men who hold office are as good as the men who elect them. The remedy is with the people. The people must be educated, not in the rudiments of learning, but in the essentials of morality, character and manhood.

MOB LAW.

Mr. Kuehnle discussed mob law. He complimented the Illinois sheriff who resisted a mob and shot to kill. He said: "If Americans will but realize that their salvation depends upon respect for the law and obedience to its authority, our liberties will ever be secure, and our flag will always wave over a re-united country without a master or a slave." He said that the laws should be rigidly enforced. Nevertheless, there is an unfortunate tendency to rely on the law too much—to expect it to produce ideal conditions.

The speaker paid an eloquent tribute to President Roosevelt as the ideal citizen. No danger menaces the nation, he thought, as the demagogue.

Fraternities, Mr. Kuehnle extolled. He called them men's "night schools." This spirit it is which actuates the co-operation responsible for insurance societies. The United States has life insurance in force today amounting to about \$20,000,000,000 while Great Britain has perhaps a fourth as much, Germany, \$1,700,000,000 and France and Russia \$400,000,000 only. It is one of the things which prove that we are not wholly decadent and selfish and that the world is getting better.

The speaker refuted the theory that the trusts are likely to seize the country. He predicted that every ill will be cured, eventually for this people always rises to the occasion.

Education is the corner stone of the republic, said the speaker. An ignorant people may be debased by a tyrant, not so when the level of intelligence is kept at a high average. We expend ten times as much for schools as for the state government. With compulsory education laws enforced there can be no danger to our nation.

"The hope of the country," said the speaker, "is universal education. It should be the duty of the government to compel a tendency for a certain period of all who are of school age as a simple means of self defense. Compulsory education, the only guarantee of universal education, is absolutely essential to the perpetuity of a government like ours, in which all the people participate. Despotism thrives and fattens upon ignorance, but republics only exist in the pure atmosphere of intelligence and universal education."

In Colorado when the miner and prospector is often shut up for months at a time, by the heavy storms until he is thoroughly bacon fed and has the scurry from this salt dirt, in southern Arizona a man can work every day in the year and almost every day climb out of his mining shaft to a perpetual sunshine and comfort in the open air or lie down and enjoy a night's rest under the open canopy of heaven, knowing that he will arise in the morning with an invigorated mind and physique subservient to the grateful action of nature.

Within 50 miles of the Tucson (which has 120000 people) there is oil to compare favorably with the best in Pennsylvania.

There is both quartz and placer gold carried in a ferruginous porphyry encased by bastrodized granite, decomposed near the surface presenting a porous appearance, these holes to be filled with iron when water level is struck. When the sulphides fill the pores, after decomposed parphyne you have a concentrating proposition on willing concentrators or a cyaniting proposition. When the gold is accompanied by too large per cent of copper and this cyaniting marking alone has displaced all others in South Africa and is at the present moment making great headway.

Arizona in saving a very high percentage of gold from over oxidized and sulphide ores. The old Vulture mine near the Hargua Holes with its 80 stamps produced (by its books) \$9000,000, but it produced in reality over \$20,000,000. The mines formerly owned by Sturges are only 30 miles from the gulf of California and are in the combination of the gold belt crossing the Avsoloro river below Wickenburg and meeting water at the gulf of California. After passing unbroken through Arizona and Sonora Mexico the Territory has inherited the gold after the days of 1849. The Tortillitas, the Santa Catalinas, the Rincons, the Santa Ritas, the Sierritas, the Tucson and the Silver Bell Mts. are full of prospectors who have awakened to the fact that they are surrounded by vast wealth in the metals and who have gone forth to try and get their share of it. Thirty-eight miles from Tucson in a southerly direction are the great gold placiers Greaterville with its 20,000 holes. Bed rock if formed at 20 to 25 ft. when often nuggets of beautiful native gold is found valued at from \$10 to \$100. All the sand to Bed Rock is full of coarse gold averaging 60 cents per cubic yard. Large operation under a hydraulic system have been commenced and are at present in operation.

Surrounding this Placior country the the bearing rock exists in hundreds of places and quartz veins. The same can be said of the Southern Belt section the Mammoth and the Antelope section all on the great Gold belt that crosses the Colorado from California in its course to the Gulf. In the neighborhood of Tucson the silver and copper deposits have been too well proven to admit of argument. Their output is too well known to need any recommendation. The Olive camp and old San Javier, Tombstone, Silver King, the Stonewall Jackson, the Vekal, the famous dermosea, the World's Fair and a dozen of the mines and camps prove the richness in silver. Lead bearing Rock while Clifton, Movenci, Globe and Besbee with a multitude of other places proves our wealth in copper, which has become so essential to day in the world's commerce. Arizona has to-day the richest mines in the world. In Yavapai county, the United Verde produces over one million dollars a month. Southern Arizona has mica, nickel, manganese and coal.

The country is unsurpassed. In the Territory can be raised tobacco that has passed favorable criticisms of the largest handlers of tobacco in the U. S. Five crops of alfalfa per annum is raised with an average price of \$11 per ton four tons to the acre and can raise all the cereals of the great grain producing states. The hunting for both large and

small game is unsurpassed. Doves, quail, wild pigeons, Jack and cotton tail rabbits, deer (white and black) mountain sheep, mountain lions, leopards, tigers and bear abound in the mountains, on the mesas, and throughout the foothills, while hundreds of antelope and lynx roam in the neighborhood of the Painted Rocks.

While out prospecting twenty miles from Tucson I shot a mountain lion mother with two kittens. The mother rolled down the cliff but I managed to get the kittens. Geo. is satisfied with this country. Hoping this will find you well and prospering on 60 cent corn, I am respectfully,
