

Green McAhren was the successful bidder for the building of the new sewer in Denison. At a special meeting of the council last Tuesday afternoon, bids were opened and he was the lowest bidder. There were five contractors bidding on his job, and their bids were as follows:

- P. F. Flynn, Denison..... \$2530 00
- A. J. Gary, Denison..... 2180 00
- G. M. McAhren, Denison..... 2140 00
- Geo. M. King, Des Moines.... 2539 00
- Andrew Kirevit, Omaha..... 2151 00

As will be seen Mr. McAhren's bid was only a few dollars less than the gentlemen from Omaha. It is his intention to begin work as soon as material can be brought to Denison. He will have an expert sewer builder as foreman, and will push the work as

speedily as possible. Being a practical man himself, the city can rest assured of a good job. There will be in the neighborhood of 4000 feet, and tile will be laid commencing at the corner near the Germania opera house and run south to the creamery. On Broadway work will commence near the old court house and run to the Wilson house, down to the Baptist church, then to Main street.

This was an action for personal injuries alleged to have been received by reason of the plaintiff having been hurt by the negligent operation of the train of the defendant at the town of Astor, on Dec. 3 1901. There was a large amount of evidence, including much testimony by physicians and surgeons as to the seriousness of the injuries. The case was given to the jury Saturday afternoon and after two hours deliberation they returned a verdict in favor of the defendant Company. Other cases were disposed of as follows:
