




### WILSON HOUSE BURNS.

Entire Roof Destroyed Tuesday Morning.

DAMAGE HARD TO ESTIMATE.

Fire Department Does Good Work. When Discovered the Entire Roof was Ablaze, Origin Unknown.

The Wilson House was discovered to be on fire Tuesday morning at about six o'clock, and before the firemen could control it, the fire had destroyed the entire third floor and roof. The loss is almost entire as the remainder of the building is damaged to a great extent. We are informed that Mr. Cook had in the neighborhood of \$4,700.00 insurance on the building and contents.

Just how the fire originated will perhaps never be known. Mr. Cook was up and had gone over to the butcher shop for meat, and upon starting back discovered flames shooting from the roof. It is not definitely known whether the fire started in the east wing or the one to the south. When discovered the entire east and southeast portion of the building was ablaze. This soon spread and it was only a short time until the entire roof and third floor were in flames. An alarm was turned in and the fire department responded promptly and it was only the heroic work of the volunteers that saved the building from complete destruction.

There were many guests at the hotel, and most of these werestill in bed when the fire alarm was given. Mr. Cook rushed up to the third floor, and succeeded in arousing everyone, and then Mr. Geo. Richardson, who is rooming at the hotel during the sickness of his little boy, came out into the hall, and he immediately spread the alarm throughout the entire building. Willing hands commenced carrying out bedding, and the parlor furniture, but much of this is spoiled on account of mud and water.

Fire Chief Sears McHenry was on and promptly and soon had four streams of water playing upon the fire, and after much hard work the flames were distinguished. During all this time there was much danger of some one getting hurt; glass was flying; timbers falling, and the firemen on the inside of the building were warned to be careful lest they get injured.

As the building now stands there is nothing left but the two lower floors, and the sides. These are practically useless as the cost of repairing and getting the building in shape would be very great.

Mr. Cook had been considering a proposition from a party to rent the hotel, and the party was expected here a few days to wind the matter up. His course is now ended. Mr. Cook does not know what he will do as he must wait until the insurance adjusters arrive and make an inventory of the damage. He has four policies on the building and contents, three for one thousand dollars each and one for seventeen hundred dollars. He will not near cover the loss.

## CUMMINS WINS BY 70,000

### ENTIRE REPUBLICAN STATE TICKET IS ELECTED BY LARGE PLURALITIES.

#### Total Vote Was Lighter Than in 1901. Republicans to Control Both Houses.

The election of 1903 is a thing of the past, and Iowa still remains "Grand Old Iowa." Governor Cummins and the entire state ticket is elected by large majorities. The republicans will control both houses.

Returns received up to 11 o'clock last night, showed an overwhelming victory for Governor Cummins, with a plurality of nearly 70,000 votes.

The vote shows a remarkably heavy vote for Governor Cummins. At 11 o'clock returns from 160 precincts gave Cummins 19,722; Sullivan, 10,988.

This vote analyzed, shows a falling off in Cummins' vote of two years ago about 6 to a precinct. The feeling at republican headquarters was that Cummins' plurality would go over 70,000. This is certain if the precinct ratio is kept up. The showing is a remarkable one and is a sweeping republican victory. Even the most sanguine republicans, including Governor Cummins himself, no one had anticipated that the vote of this year would approach the magnificent plurality of 83,119 of two years ago.

The vote of this year is a peculiar one. There are remarkable gains in some quarters with equally remarkable losses at others. These fluctuations seem unaccountable and Chairman Spence said last night he was unable to explain them.

The vote throughout the state seems light, which leaves Governor Cummins a high percentage of gain, without any remarkable showing on the part of Jerry B. Sullivan.

#### OHIO IS REPUBLICAN.

The Plurality Will Not be Less Than 125,000.

The entire Ohio Republican state ticket is elected. The legislature will be republican, the republicans carrying all the doubtful districts.

#### NEW YORK CITY BACK TO TAMMANY

McClellan Elected Mayor by Plurality of 61,000 Over Low.

Geo. B. McClellan, son of the civil war commander, defeated Seth Low, present mayor of New York. This is spite of united war waged by all the ministers of that city, combined with nearly all the newspapers. New York will now be in the hands of Tammany men, and will be "a wide open" town.

Democrats carry Boston, but the state goes republican by big majority. Gov. Bates was re-elected by 37,000 plurality.

#### USUAL RESULT IN CRAWFORD

Democrat. Elect Entire County Ticket Except Butterworth.

#### REPUBLICANS PROVE HEAVY SCRATCHERS

Sullivan Carries County By From 200 to 300—Reign of the Incompetents to Continue

Once more Crawford has decided to remain in the democratic column, and this time it is a clean sweep, except the surveyor, Uncle Morris winning by a small margin. The republicans were beaten by the unexpectedly large vote in the county precincts and by the republicans themselves. At least one half of the republican ticket received enough democratic votes to have been elected had the republicans remained loyal, so that the party has no one but

exception of the heavy vote for Kuhl, Denison staid by the republican county ticket in good shape all the candidates running well together. Had Vail treated the Denison candidates as well as Denison treated Dr. Darling the result would have been much closer.

However the REVIEW does not think this a time for recrimination, the Denison republicans who are sore to-day should remember that some of them have given other precincts occasion to be sore at other times. There is but one thing for Crawford county republicans to do—to bury any hatchets they may have about them one thousand fathoms deep, and start in next year without grudges of any kind. The Denison republican who to-day swears vengeance is put perpetuation democratic misrule in this county.

The republicans have nothing to regret in their campaign. It was clean and manly throughout. The ticket was far superior to the one elected and this we believe the voters will find out before two years have elapsed. For our part we have had enough of candidate campaigns. The republicans decided on a "still hunt", and they are still

hunting. We believe in a campaign on party issues, an aggressive educational campaign that shall place principles above men. The above is not said in criticism of the republican county chairman who simply conducted the campaign as the republicans seemed to desire.

We have sincere and genuine sympathy for those defeated candidates who put time and money into the campaign, and who fought bravely to win. To some of these, defeat means much more even than victory does to their opponents, and for them our regret is deep.

The REVIEW has no regrets or apologies to make for its part in the campaign. It fought for the whole ticket; it told the truth and nothing but the truth; it abused no man personally, but did its best for the party and the ticket.

Perhaps we are unduly optimistic, but we have not lost faith in the ultimate redemption of republicanism and good county government. Such a defeat as the present one ought to have a chastening effect upon republicans, and we do not believe the present method of managing county affairs will long commend itself even to democrats.
