ROBBERS ELVE OPEN SAFE

Bank at Sheridan, Ore., Loses Seven Thousand Dollars in Coin.
Sheridan, Ore., Oct. 27.—At 3 a. m. burglars entered the banking house of Scroggins & Workman in this place, blew open the safe with giant powder, secured \$7,000 in coin and made their escape before the sleeping residents of the town could be aroused.
The building was not materially damaged. The explosion awakened Mayor Eakin, who lives over his store across the street from the bank. Looking from his window a moment later he saw the robbers emerge from the bank, jump into a rig and drive away. The mayor secured a rifle and fired three shots at the men as they disappeared down the road. Outside the building a sledge and two picks were found. The robbers took nothing from the vault but the money.

DOWIE MAKES SENSATION

Declares Himself Scion of Prominent English House.

BITTER AGAINST NEWSPAPERS.

Rages Over Publication of Letters from Reputed Father at Essex, Ia. Prays God to Muzzle or Destroy Press of the Country.

New York, Oct. 27.—In a broken voice, with tears streaming down his face and his body shaking with emotion, John Alexander Dowie strode upon the platform in Madison Square Garden before an audience of 10,000 persons and announced that, in truth, he was not the son of John Murray Dowie of Essex, Ia., from whom he takes his patronymic, but that his father was a British army officer of high family by a "Scotch marriage." He heaped vilification and denunciation upon John Murray Dowie, whom he declared had made his mother believe her marriage to Dowie's father was shameful, and the army officer having been taken away by his relatives, his mother in the first flush of her shame had sought to give her son a name by marrying John Murray Dowie.

The revelation was made at the end of an hour's tirade against the press of this city, its treatment of his work and himself, being styled a "conspiracy of falsehood." The reporters were denounced as "yellow dogs and heinous reptiles, who have wrecked thousands of homes and broken thousands of hearts."

He led up to the publication of extracts from letters passing between himself and John Murray Dowie, indicating Dowie's renunciation of the latter as a parent, and which were responsible for the general overseer's partial exposition of the great secret of his life.

Shouting at one moment in a fit of violent rage at the newspapers, Mr. Dowie would the next moment speak in the most gentle voice of his mother and wife, and the great audience was moved by his evident emotion. Worn out and at times bursts of applause greeted his declarations.

At the close of his address Dowie pronounced this benediction: "God look down upon the irresponsible hands of the criminals who write the papers and publish their lies and have mercy on them. Have mercy, O God, and grant grace to the country and may it muzzle and if need be destroy the newspapers."

CATTLE KILLED, BUT MEN ALIVE.

Strange Results Follow Collision of Two Freight Trains.

Omaha, Oct. 27.—Seven trainmen narrowly escaped death in a collision between two stock trains near Seymour road on the B. & M. railroad.

Both trains were heavily loaded with stock. Each train upon reaching the summit of the hill in the vicinity of Seymour road put on a full head of steam and ran down the steep grade as fast as possible in the endeavor to get a sufficient momentum to carry it up the steep grade ahead of it. The first train had made the run down the hill and failed to acquire sufficient momentum to get up the hill on the other side. The train in the rear came down the hill with great speed and it appeared to the engineer that the train ahead of him was proceeding slowly up the steep grade ahead of him, but when it was too late to stop his train he saw that the train in front had come to a standstill.

The engine of the rear train smashed into the caboose and two cars of the first train. And a most remarkable thing happened. In the caboose were seven men, and with the exception of a slight bruise upon one of them not a single one was harmed. The engine continued to plow its way through the next two cattle cars, however, and cattle were killed in each of these cars. The caboose was literally smashed to pieces and the engine was reduced to bits of scrap iron, and yet through it all the seven passengers in the caboose escaped with slight bruises. Several head of cattle, however, in the stock cars ahead were killed.

Soesbe Is Nominated.

Shell Rock, Ia., Oct. 27.—The Bremer-Butler Republican senatorial convention, declared by the state board of elections to have been illegally conducted, reconvened here to fill the place declared vacant. The voting was by call of counties. Butler's thirteen delegates voted according to their instructions. E. W. Soesbe of Greene was nominated. Bremer's ten votes were cast for A. M. Whaley of Aplington.

Rescued in Starving Condition.

Honolulu, Oct. 27.—The second and last missing boat of the wrecked French bark Constable de Richemont was picked up by an inter-island steamer. It contained the boatswain and seven of the crew of the lost vessel. All were alive, though in a starving condition, having been almost entirely without food since their separation from the other boat of survivors on Oct. 14.

Sentenced to Be Shot.

Ogden, Utah, Oct. 27.—At Farmington Judge Rolapp sentenced Nick Hawthorn to be shot on Friday, Dec. 11. Hawthorn killed Thomas Sandall, watchman in a store at Layton. Hawthorn was one of the prisoners who escaped from the penitentiary two weeks ago and was recaptured after our day's liberty.

PASTOR QUILTS THE PULPIT.

Kansas City Clergyman Resigns to Escape Church Trial.

Kansas City, Oct. 27.—Rev. E. Gammage, pastor of the Lawn Avenue Baptist church of Kansas City, Kan., has resigned his pastorate at the request of the board of deacons, because of alleged heretical teachings. Mr. Gammage had been threatened with a trial for heresy, but anticipated such proceedings. Many members of the church withdrew with Rev. Gammage, who says he will establish a new church. "I believe," said he, "if men have the faith, Christ will work miracles with them today, the same as he did 2,000 years ago. I shall advocate this in the future and will at once begin to establish a full bible Baptist church that will accept every word of God's book." J. W. Mode, chairman of the board of deacons, said: "The action was taken because we did not believe Mr. Gammage was preaching the true religion. He is the advocate of divine healing and believes man can become so whole or sanctified that they can be without sin. Our religion says man can sin either in thought or in deed. He further advances the post-millennium theory that when Christ comes again he will reign in the air and the truly righteous will rise to meet him. We believe Christ will again rule on earth."

ADMIRAL BOWLES RESIGNS.

Accepts Offer of Presidency of a Ship Building Company.

Washington, Oct. 27.—Rear Admiral Francis T. Bowles, chief of the bureau of construction and repairs of the navy department, tendered his resignation as an officer in the United States navy to the president and it was accepted to take effect Oct. 31. Constructor W. L. Capps, now on duty at the New York navy yard, has been selected by the president for the vacancy. Admiral Bowles is leaving the naval service to accept the presidency of a private ship building company in Massachusetts.

Secretary Moody, in announcing the resignation of Admiral Bowles, said it was received with profound regret not only by himself but by the president. The admiral's private reasons, which could not be overcome, said the secretary, had to be acquiesced in. Admiral Bowles said that after twenty-eight years of service he regretted to leave the navy, in which his duties and surroundings had been so extremely agreeable. The offer of the presidency of a ship building company which had been made him, however, he added, presented opportunities to continue his professional work and would permit him to live in his native state, and he therefore thought he must accept.

Elections in Eleven States.

New York, Oct. 27.—Elections will be held in eleven states Tuesday, Nov. 3. Full state tickets are to be voted for in Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Maryland, Ohio, Kentucky, Iowa and Mississippi while in New York, Pennsylvania, Nebraska and Colorado a justice of the upper courts, regents of the state university or minor state officers are to be chosen. Municipal officials are to be selected in Greater New York, San Francisco and Salt Lake.

Sunday School Union Adjourns.

Chicago, Oct. 27.—The closing session of the eleventh annual conference of the American Sunday School union was addressed by Rev. B. L. Webber of Marshall, Minn., and F. L. Shindler of Springfield, Mo. Reports on the financial standing of the union showed that in the last year \$180,000 had been raised for the work of the society.

Crew and Passengers Lost.

Brest, France, Oct. 27.—The French bark Savoyard has been wrecked near here. Thirty-one of its crew, the captain's wife and four other men were lost.

TELEGRAMS TERSELY TOLD.

The postoffice sale at Escanaba, Mich., was blown and \$1,000 cash and stamps taken.

Prince Adelbert, son of Emperor William of Germany, has started for the far east to join the German squadron there.

The bank of the Chickashaw nation at Tishomingo has closed its doors. The capital stock of the bank was \$50,000. The amount of deposits is unknown.

Snow fell for the first time this season in many places in New England, reaching a depth of more than two inches in northern New Hampshire and Vermont.

The demands made by the 1,000 canners employed in the Chicago packing houses for an increase of 2 1/2 per cent in wages has been refused by the packers.

A special investigation of the New York postoffice will begin in a few days by inspectors working under the direction of Fourth Assistant Postmaster General Bristow.

G. Bauer formerly connected with the Bauer Grocery company of St. Louis, filed a petition in bankruptcy at Chicago, placing his debts at \$67,000. No assets were named.

Robbers ransacked the home of Robert Robinson, a wealthy farmer, near Perryville, Ky., and administered poison to Robinson and his wife, which will probably result in her death at least.

Isaac Stover was arrested on a complaint filed by his sister, charging him with murdering her husband, Edward Bittner, at Lewisburg, Ind., over twenty-five years ago. She was an eyewitness to the murder with two other persons.
