

Thanksgiving Day, that blessed, blessed day, when in the days gone by the father and the mother and the children all sat at the holiday feast and bowed their heads as the mother lead in prayer. Gone is it now, tired heads and hearts are laid to rest, the trials they laid down we now must bear. We must erect our family altar anew out of the ashes of the past. But we can thank God for the memories, the blessed memories of Thanksgiving day.

Each generation, each individual has had problems to face, ills to bear, crosses and hardships, but always and ever there is much, yes very much, for which we may be thankful.

It is a truth that one can thank himself for nine-tenths of the ills of life, and others for nine-tenths of life's blessings. No man need grieve over failure to which he has not contributed. The man who has done his best, who has fought the battle of life valiantly need have no regrets though fortune frowns, and he can still give thanks that God has given, it to him to be entered as one of the good and faithful servants.

Thanksgiving Day should be a day not only of full stomachs but full hearts. It should be a day of high resolve and high purpose.
