### TOM HORN IS HUNG.

#### Indian Fighter and Detective Meets His Just Deserts at Cheyenne, Wyo.

Tom Horn, the detective, employed by the cattle kings of the west to guard the ranges, was hung at Cheyenne on last Friday, for the shooting of fourteen-year-old Willie Nickell, on July 18th, 1901. This case has attracted wide attention, because of the fact that so many wealthy cattle owners were backing Horn. Thousands of dollars were spent in effort to clear him, but to no avail. At the last it was necessary that the state militia be stationed around the jail as it was feared efforts would be made to rescue him. The cattle kings had assured Horn that he would never hang. The history of the case is a long one. Horn had warned the Nickells to keep off the range, and when he saw the boy driving the cattle, he took aim and shot him dead from ambush.

### HORTON IS FOUND GUILTY.

#### Sam Horton, Found Guilty of Assault with Intent to do Bodily Injury.

Sam Horton, at one time a porter in the barber shop under the post office has been found guilty of assault with intent to commit bodily injury by the grand jury in Sioux City. Some time ago in an altercation with a man at Sioux City he threw a rock and put the fellow's eye out. Sam claimed it was in self defense, but the evidence produced was different. The penalty for the offense with which he is charged is not to exceed one year in the penitentiary or a fine of \$500.

The citizens of Kiron, Schleswig, and Ricketts are feeling pretty good over the fact that the North-Western has again placed the passenger train on the Moodamin line. For a time it looked as though there would be a boycott all along that line, now that the company has again established the passenger everybody is feeling good and the company is in good standing.

Frank J. Stillman, brother of Paul E. Stillman, of the Jefferson Bee, and himself a part owner of the property, has been appointed to an \$1,800 position on the U. S. senate roll, taking the place made vacant by the death of Col. Richard Root, who had charge of the doorkeepers of the senate gallery until the time of his death. The appointment was made by the special request of Senator Dolliver.

A very jovial crowd swooped down on John Huie at his country home Saturday afternoon and before that worthy had a chance to protest they had taken possession of the place and assumed entire charge. When Mr. Huie "recovered" he was informed that they had taken advantage of his 59th birthday and had come to remind him that age requires comfort and that hereafter he would be expected to sit in the Morris chair which had been purchased for his especial convenience. Refreshments, taken for the occasion, were served. The occasion was heartily enjoyed by all present. — Dunlap Reporter

The Traer Star-Clipper offers a note of warning that should be read everywhere in Iowa. "Cloth peddlers are working the Toledo territory and are likely to come here. They bait farmers by offering a few articles at very low prices and then propose to sell a large package of woolen and other goods in a hurry at \$48. Strange as it is, they are finding numerous suckers. The merchants of Toledo have made a proposition to duplicate the goods for \$20, yet we venture that the peddlers will be able to do enough business to line their pockets, in the face of this offer and of all past experience the farmers have had with such fakirs."

Along about dark tonight the boys will come wearily home and be scolded. ## A Washington Letter

O. H. OLSON.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 20th, 1903. Congress has not been especially pressed for time the past week. In fact, it seems to be something of a problem with members and senators as to how they may employ their surplus time pending the appointment of the various committees, and the opening of the regular session. It is not expected that anything of importance will be done at this extraordinary session, save the disposition of the Cuban Reciprocity Treaty. Speaker Cannon and the minority leader, John Sharp Williams, are quite active and are not finding life entirely harmonious at this time. The wishes and ambitions of congressmen frequently conflict with respect to their favorite committee places and it becomes the delicate duty of the party leaders, and particularly of the speakers to adjust these difficulties, and to smooth out the ruffled spirits of the disappointed ones. A few parliamentary skirmishes have been enacted, and some attempts made to disparage the attitude of the administration on certain questions. The recent Panama revolution has fomented certain perturbed conditions and serves as a pretext for partisan maneuvers. Williams and Grosvenor have contributed notable speeches already, and the Mark Twain of Congress, who hails from the state that gave to his country the original Mark Twain, Champ Clark has also had his little fling. He never fails to inject a liberal quantity of humor into his talks to the house, and rarely fails to make some cursory remarks relative to the shortcomings of his traditional enemy, the Republican party, which are not calculated to invest it with increased confidence of the voting public, but when one bears in mind the fact that the speaker is more famous for his humor than for his achievements, the point falls flat.

That veteran actor, and Dean of the American stage, Joseph Jefferson, is performing at the New National Theatre here this week. His chief role is that of Rip Van Winkle, and the humor, pathos and spontaneity with which he embodies this popular and jovial vagabond of Irving's story renders Jefferson a theatrical ideal. Forty-five years ago he presented in Washington his first characterization of Rip Van Winkle, and on Monday night in a certain speech after the performance, he called attention to this fact and suggested that perhaps in the audience might be found grand children of people who were entertained by his first presentation of the play. The play, as staged by Jefferson is Dion Boucicault's version, which differs slightly from that of Washington Irving. Those who heard Jefferson when he was younger may have heard a more forceable actor than the Jefferson of today, but in the subtlety of suggestion and consummate histrionic talent, it is doubtful whether he ever excelled the performance of the past week. The character of Rip as conceived by Jefferson calls for no great emotional strain or demonstration, but demands a remarkable knowledge of human nature, and a mastery of the art of character portrayal. The wonderful possibilities of the art are splendidly exemplified by this veteran of the foot lights.

Judge Conner and Mrs. Conner spent Saturday and Sunday at Brodenton, where their son, Raymond, attends college. They are again established in the Hamilton, which has been their home since coming to Washington.

The oriental habit of flattery prevails here to a greater extent than at any other place which I have visited. The fawning grafter who clings to the garments of legislators and heads of departments is but a single species of this variegated order. As an illustration of the most universal nature of this moral mady, I might cite the case of the land lady who wished to rent to me one of her rooms. In response to my query, she assured me that she had rooms that were marvels of convenience, neatness and attractiveness. She stated emphatically that the one was a fifteen dollar room, but seeing that I was a fine gentleman I might have it at twelve dollars. I told her I was charmed with the room, and that I had a friend who also wished to rent a room. This opened a new vista to her. She immediately became if possible more obsequious, and on my suggesting a figure for both rooms, she acquiesced with seeming reluctance, and made the concession on the condition that my friend was "as fine a gentleman as yourself," and then not discerning any hint of approval in my facial expression, she bolstered up her mistake by adding with an air of ostentation and judicious discrimination "as you seem to be." Not only is there a mistaken idea of gallantry which prompts the Washingtonian to lavish the most absurd and incongruous flattery upon certain people, but what is more dispicable and culpable, if less pitiable, is the action of the man with sinister and selfish designs, who seeks by sycophancy and cringing obsequiousness to gain certain objects and advantages for himself.
