FANCY WORK.

As pin cushions and bags are all the rage this year for gifts, I will send in a pattern of each.

Stocking Bag Cut two circles of paste board ten inches in diameter, cover one side with pink silk and the other side with green silk with flowers in. Overhand the two together, now take strip of the flowered goods five inches wide and that will go around circle once; now cut another strip same size from the pink Overhand together or seam it and slip in embroidery hoop of small size. Feather-stitch along the edge; place a bow of either color at each side, also one half yard to hang up by.

Even glass cases. Ribbon 24 inches long and 3 inches wide, fold in centre and pass through a small brass ring fringe 2 inches deep now take two pieces ribbon 5 inches long and the width of the other, on one piece outline a pair of specs and on the other a spray of flowers now over hand together the pockets to the ribbon just above the fringe now to fasten in place turning, take a piece of kid and cut in pretty shape and tack to place and its nice to place in one pocket a square say 5 inches each way, pinked just to be handy you know to clear the peo's off.

A nice pudding receipt I will also give. Peel and slice a quart of nice tart apples, now make batter as follows, 1 cup sweet milk and cream mixed, 2 tablespoonful sugar, a pinch of salt, 1 egg and 2 teaspoonful baking powder make a batter with flour a little stiffer than pancakes, butter a basin, spread a layer of batter then the apples and then the remainder of batter, bake 1/2 hour, serve with sweetened cream with flavoring to suit the taste, excellent.
