OLD SOLDIER DEAD

Mr. Hans J. Lorentzen Dies at the Home of His Son.

HE HELD AN EXCELLENT WAR RECORD

Was Three Times Promoted For Valiant Service. Enlisted from Wisconsin in the Ninth Infantry.

Mr. Hans J. Lorentzen, an old and respected war veteran, died at the home of his son Herman in Denison on Friday evening Dec 4 at 7.30 o'clock after a short illness. He was 72 years of age at the time of his death and leaves seven children to mourn his death. The funeral was held at the Lutheran church on Tuesday, Dec. 8.

Hans J. Lorentzen was born in Bergshusen, Germany, February 15, 1832, and removed to this country in 1854, settling at New Holstein, Wis. where he was married to Miss Margartha Jensen, in 1856, soon after the close of the war. Eight children were born to this union, all with the exception of one are still living. The deceased came to Denison in the year 1887 and has made this place his home ever since, where he has followed his trade, that of a painter. He was considered a first-rate painter and sign writer and had plenty of work when he was able to attend to it. He was not always in the best of health, his age and injuries received during the war incapacitating him. At the outbreak of the civil war he enlisted with the Ninth Wisconsin Infantry, Company K, and was its first sergeant. Afterward he was promoted for good service to second lieutenant of Company B in December 1862, and in August 1863 was again promoted to first lieutenant in Company H. In the early part of 1865 the regiment was reorganized and Mr. Lorentzen was again honored by being appointed captain of Company C, which position he held with honor until he was mustered out and received honorable discharge in 1866. He was a good soldier, serving his country and flag well, and his promotions were duly earned.

The G. A. R. post of Denison turned out to attend his funeral as did a host of friends who will miss the genial disposition and the many war stories he was so fond of telling.

Denison Defeats Dunlap Ten Pins.

On Wednesday night a match game of ten pins was played between Dunlap and Denison in Denison on the Denison Company's alleys. Denison won by a total of 162 pins, and two out of three games. Counterfeiters Elude Officers.

St. Louis, Dec. 8.—According to a story told the police by Edward Ratcliffe, arrested on suspicion of being a member of a counterfeiting gang, there was, up to last night, enough counterfeit paper money in a room on Olive street to flood the entire city. He said that packages of spurious bills, piled over six feet high, occupied one corner of the room and numerous other packages were scattered over the floor. Detectives immediately visited the room, but Ratcliffe's alleged confederates had fled and taken every vestige of the counterfeiting outfit with them. For more than a week reports have been made at police headquarters that a trio of men were passing counterfeit bills in the north portion of the city.

To Raise Grade of Galveston.

Galveston, Dec. 8.—Bids for raising the grade of the city—a task which promises to take its place as one of the nine wonders of the world—were opened by the board appointed by the governor. The lowest bid is from P. C. Goedhart and Linden W. Bates of New York, who offer to do the work for 18½ cents per cubic yard. There are approximately 11,000,000 cubic yards of filling to be placed in order to raise the grade of the city on a level with the sea wall. The average increase in grade is seven feet. It will cost nearly \$2,000,000, for which the city will issue bonds.

Kills His Brother-in-Law.

Oklahoma City, O. T., Dec. 8.—Oscar Letheredge killed Oscar Smith, his brother-in-law, crushing his skull with a stick of stove wood and probably fatally wounded the latter's brother, J. E. Smith, both boys, at their home near here. Mrs. Letheredge, who had secured a divorce from him, had gone to her father's house. He went there to see them and when the elder Smith refused him admittance Letheredge forced the door. The boys tried to eject him and the fatal fight followed.

Officers Save Negro From Mob.

St. Louis, Dec. 8.—Joe Irwin, a negro, narrowly escaped violent treatment at the hands of a mob in East St. Louis, following the shooting by Irwin of F. Lawson, a white man, in an attempted holdup. Two hundred persons were in the crowd that gathered after the shooting, but quick work by policemen saved the negro and landed him unharmed in the East St. Louis police station. Lawson is not expected to live.

Robbers Loot Pesthouse.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Dec. 8.—The city pesthouse, just beyond the city limits, was burglarized and nearly everything conveniently portable, including the bedding, was carried away. Until recently the house had been for several months almost constantly occupied by smallpox patients. It is not believed the robbers knew the character of the place they were burglarizing.

Vessel and Crew Lost.

St. Johns, N. F., Dec. 8.—The vessel which was wrecked on Ferryland Head, near Cape Race, during a furious storm at midnight Friday last, proves to be the Danish schooner Sigfried Petersen, from Alicante, Spain, for St. Johns. Her crew of five persons perished and their bodies were washed ashore. The vessel was battered to pieces.

Des Moines Firm Bankrupt.

Des Moines, Dec. 8.—H. G. Stuffer & Co., general merchandise, filed a petition in voluntary bankruptcy in the United States court. Liabilities, \$34,000. The Bank of Colfax, of which S. W. Woods was president, had \$15,000. The failure to realize on this account is believed to have precipitated the crash.

SALE IS A SUCCESS.

Large Crowds in Attendance Each Day, Goods Sold Well.

Saturday was market day at the sale and supplies were sold for Sunday dinner. The best cooks of Denison contributed to this department of the enterprise and there was no trouble in disposing of the stock as many were eager to avail themselves of such an opportunity.

The sale was eminently successful. It was a clearing house for second hand goods and many people were enabled to obtain articles to suit their needs at a small cost. The proceeds were a little over \$400.

Everybody cannot help but commend the enterprise and the different committees are to be commended. They worked hard for the success of the undertaking, and their efforts are responsible for the outcome of the sale.

L. B. Lorenzen Dead.

On Saturday Nov. 29, 1903, occurred the death of Mr. Lorenzen B. Lorenzen, at the home of his daughter Mrs. Boyens, in Hanover township. The funeral was held Tuesday following, and burial took place in Nissen cemetery.

Mr. Lorenzen was the father of Mr. A. B. Lorenzen and was 74 years of age at the time of his death. He was born in Schleswig-Holstein, Germany in April, 1830 and came to America in 1873, settling in Clinton, Iowa, where he lived three years, and then came to Crawford County where he has since resided. In 1852 he was married to Miss Amelia Godberson, and three children were born to them, namely: A. B. Lorenzen, Mrs. Adeline Petersen and Mrs. Anna Boyens, of Hanover township.

Deceased was a quiet, industrious man, and lived an honorable life. He lived to see his children honored, loved and prosperous, and he was content.
