Washington Letter.

O. H. OLSON.

On Monday, December 7th, at noon, the regular session will commence, and at present it appears that the extra session will be permitted to merge into the regular session, as there seems to be no disposition to adjourn except from time to time. The only important action of the present session has been the passage of the Cuban Reciprocity bill in the House. The Senate for some inexplicable reason has postponed its passage until after the regular session has opened up. On last Tuesday the House met according to the adjournment of last Friday, and after the roll call it was agreed that each side should be permitted to talk thirty minutes, in order to relieve members of the campaign thunder within them. Williams, of Mississippi, DeArmond, of Missouri, and Gaines, of Tennessee, each gave vent to their pent up emotions, or to be more courteous, their convictions. Hemenway, the successor of Cannon, as chairman of the committee on Appropriations, Col. Hepburn, of the 8th Iowa district, and Grosvenor, of Ohio, also gave expression to their feelings and opinions. Hepburn was greeted with cheers when he arose. Those who had heard him before knew just about what was in store for the trembling democrats who were present. This rough old soldier who fights his forensic in the fashion after which he must have fought rebels during the "late unpleasantness" is not particularly graceful in manner, nor does he use the best or choicest language imaginable; but there is one element which he does possess in abundance, and that is force. He fairly hammers his arguments down the throats of those against whom they are directed. He is regarded as one of the most effective partisan speakers and campaigners in the House. In a running debate he is abundantly able to take care of himself, and usually makes his pursuers look like the proverbial thirty cents. He had spoken but a few moments on Tuesday when a meek looking blonde member arose and asked leave to propound a question. "No, Sir" thundered Mr. Hepburn; then turning to the speaker, he asked: "Who is the gentleman who just interrupted me?" The speaker informed him that the gentleman in question was Mr. Baker, of New York. Mr. Hepburn replied: "I still adhere to my denial."

Washington is perhaps the only place in the United States that does not enjoy that great prerogative, usually considered inalienable, local self government. It is now governed by Congress. Considering the solicitude for its well being and generosity with respect to appropriations that Congress has exhibited, there can be no cause for complaint. One democratic senator very unkindly declared last winter that it was because of the increasing number of colored people here that the district was placed under the control of Congress in order to escape "negro domination." However that may be, the happy change was brought about, and the city of Washington has profited greatly by the change. Plans are being offered from time to time, some of them colossal in their import, to beautify the city, and make it the most beautiful and attractive capitol in the world. In one of the plans it is proposed to remove all the buildings on the Mall, the territory extending from the capitol west to the Potomac river, and to transform this section into a magnificent park. There have even been constructed relief plans of Washington, the one reproducing Washington in miniature, and the other representing Washington as it will be when the proposed plans have been carried out. These models evidently represent an exceedingly laborious and expensive task, as no house is too small to be recognized by the artist in his work, each being faithfully and accurately placed in its proper location. These plans rest under glass covers in the Congressional library. They suggest something of what Washington may be in the future. While an exhibition of mere barbaric splendor is unwarranted it would appear that a country possessing the wealth, scope and significance that the United States enjoys, should not fail to beautify and develop its capitol, that it may rank with the great capitols of the world. It has made an excellent beginning, and needs but to continue at a slightly accelerated rate to find itself at an early date possessed of the most charming seat of national government in the world. One of the forces combating the spirit of progress is the veneration, not wholly culpable, that exists for historic associations and conditions. Many regard as deeds of vandalism the destruction and wreckage of historic buildings to give way for modern structures of greater capacity and utility. This notion carried to extremes is hostile to progress, and is in accord with the Chinese philosophy which depreciates the presumption that the wisdom of ancestors is assailable, or that any change of their plans are justifiable. The material relics of the past are perhaps more eloquent reminders than dusty books, but there is a proper limit to all things.
