

COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors of Crawford County, January Session

AFTERNOON SESSION, JAN. 15.

At 1 o'clock p. m. the Denison Bulletin, Denison Review, and Crawford County Observer filed a statement of their bona fide yearly subscribers with the county auditor, which were opened in the presence of the board and were as follows: Denison Bulletin, 1900 names; Denison Review, 1000 names; Crawford County Observer, 475 names. Also the Charter Oak Times filed an amended statement of 32 names with their bona fide list of 461 names which had been filed January 13, 1904.

Crawford County Observer objects to the board of supervisors of Crawford county, Iowa, considering any names on an alleged list or amended list filed by H. H. Sturgis for the following reasons: 1st, that on the 13th day of January, 1904, H. H. Sturgis filed a list of his subscribers with the county auditor of Crawford county, Iowa; 2nd, the records show that the hearing on the 15th day of January, 1904, is merely a continued hearing of the 13th day of January, 1904; 3rd, that on the 13th day of January H. H. Sturgis made no objections to the board of supervisors allowing the other papers to file their lists on the 15th day of January; 4th, that H. H. Sturgis did not secure the consent of the board to file an amended list as to this time; 5th, that the amended list shows on its face that the subscribers were secured since the 13th day of January, and that they never received a copy of the paper.

It was moved and seconded that the objection of the Crawford County Observer as to the amended list of the Charter Oak Times be sustained. Molter, aye; Holland, aye; Ahart, aye; Cook, aye; Schroeder, nay. To which ruling of the board the Charter Oak Times takes exception.

The Charter Oak Times objects to the board of supervisors considering the list of subscribers as filed by the Crawford County Observer because the same was not filed on or before 1 p. m. January 13, 1904, duly sworn to as required by statute, and because the same was filed at a time subsequent to said date without the order of the board first obtained, and for the further reason that the said list when filed shows a list of subscribers smaller than that of the Charter Oak Times and does not conform to the form as required by statute.

It was moved and seconded that the objection of the Charter Oak Times as to the subscription list of the Crawford County Observer be overruled. Molter, aye; Ahart, aye; Cook, aye; Holland, aye; Schroeder, nay. To which ruling of the board the Charter Oak Times excepts.

The Charter Oak Times objects to the board of supervisors considering the list of subscribers of the Denison Bulletin because the same was not filed on or before 1 p. m. January 13, 1904, duly sworn to as required by law, and for the further reason that the evidence does not show that the said list when filed was sworn to as required by statute, and for the further reason that the same was filed at a date subsequent to January 13, 1904, without the order of the board first obtained.

It was moved and seconded that the objection of the Charter Oak Times to a consideration of the list of the Denison Bulletin be overruled. Molter, aye; Ahart, aye; Cook, aye; Holland, aye; Schroeder, aye. To which ruling of the Charter Oak Times excepts.

The Charter Oak Times objects to the board of supervisors considering the subscription list of the Denison Review because the same was not filed on or before 1 p. m. January 13, 1904, duly sworn to as required by statute, and for the further reason that the said list was filed at a date subsequent thereto without the consent of the board first obtained and contrary to the provision of the statute.

It was moved and seconded that the objection of the Charter Oak Times as to the consideration of the subsequent list of the Denison Review be overruled. Molter, aye; Ahart, aye; Cook, aye; Holland, aye; Schroeder, aye. To which ruling of the Charter Oak Times excepts.

The Crawford County Observer objects to the list of the Charter Oak Times filed January 13, 1904, for the reason that the names on said list are not all actual bona fide yearly subscribers, and for the further reason that the said list are not names of actual residents of Crawford county, Iowa.

It was moved and seconded that the Denison Review, Denison Bulletin, and Crawford County Observer be selected as the official papers for the year 1904. Molter, aye; Ahart, aye; Cook, aye; Holland, aye; Schroeder, aye.

To which action of the board of supervisors the Charter Oak Times takes exception and gives notice of appeal.

Board adjourned at 9 p. m. to meet Wednesday, January 20th, at 9 a. m.
