**CITY POLITICS**

In another column we publish the call for the republican city caucuses. As the majority party in the city of Denison it is the duty of republicans to place a good clean ticket in the field, one in every way worthy the support of republicans and good citizens. We believe this will be done, and that the republican caucus will give fair opportunity for every republican to be heard and for any one who has claims to be recognized.

For some days our democratic friends have urged that partisanship be laid aside and the present city officers be renominated by a citizen's caucus. Without reflecting on anyone personally affected by this plan, the republican committeemen and other working republicans have felt this course to be unwise and not for the best of the city or the party. There would probably in any event, be two tickets in the field. It would be better then to have two good tickets backed by responsible political parties than to have, say one good ticket and one ticket representing the less law-abiding element. Should republicans and democrats do their duty as they doubtless will, Denison will be assured good administration in any event.

Senator D. L. Hogue is being urged as a candidate for congress in the 11th district. If there is to be a change and many think there will be, a better choice than E. L. Hogue could not be made. He is straightforward, sincere, strong in his leadership and effective in all he undertakes. If there is any chance for him to win the nomination Monona county would "do itself proud" by pushing his claims. Either E. L. Hogue or your Uncle George Perkins would make mighty good congressmen from the big eleventh.

With the nearer approach of the congressional convention the indications for the unanimous renomination of Judge Conner are growing apace. The much talked of opposition in the north end of the district has so far proven a sad failure for its boomers, while the south end of the district presents a solid front for the congressman. Winnebago county in the extreme north of the district, the only county whose convention, has been held, has offered no aid or comfort to any opposition to Judge Conner. Crawford and Hancock whose conventions will be held March 11th can be counted in the Conner column. There is no doubt as to Judge Conner's renomination but his friends are now urging the wisdom of his unanimous endorsement and we believe it will come.

We wish to express genuine regret over the defeat of Senator Healy for federal judge. He has proven himself in many fields to be a man of exceptional ability and fitness. The loss to the federal bench is still greater than the personal loss to Mr. Healy. At the same time we wish to congratulate Senator Dolliver and Judge Conner for the determined and gallant fight they made for their candidate. No men could have been more stalwart. No stone was left unturned, and there can be no thought in the mind of any man that they did not do their utmost. We have heard no expression from Mr. Healy. Doubtless he is disappointed in that feeling we share, we know however that he has nothing but gratitude in his heart for those who stood by him so faithfully through thick and thin and that his Fort Dodge friends share in this feeling.

Geo. R. Kirkpatrick of Topeka, Kan., made a speech at the city hall Saturday evening on the subject of Capital and Labor. About thirty people attended and were well entertained for an hour by the speaker, who is a young man and an able talker. The speech was socialistic throughout and was a tirade against the present industrial system. He made free use of the methods of calumny howlers, and attempted to stir up class hatred by arraying one class against another. He asserted that the working class does not share in the present prosperity, that the wages of the working man will not buy as much as they would four or five years ago, and dwelt on the assertion that the working man of today cannot get wages enough to buy anything more than cheap clothes, cheap food, cheap shelter and cheap furniture.

He offered socialism as a sure cure for all these evils and advocated public ownership of all public facilities. When asked how the government could get control of these facilities he said that the socialist party did not attempt to say, on his own personal responsibility, however, he offered a plan which he thought would work without even changing the present constitution, that of imposing a 100 per cent tax on the industries which the government wished to control.

At the close of the meeting, socialistic literature was distributed to any who desired to take it.



**DEATH OF BENTON MILES.**

Benton Miles, who died March 5th at Greely, was born in Monroe county Iowa, May 28th, 1819. In 1869 he came with his parents to Denison, Iowa where he spent the younger years of his life. Later he spent several years in Colorado then returned to Denison where he married Miss Anna Smith in 1891. In a few years their happy married life was broken by the death of the wife, leaving two small children who now mourn the loss of father and mother. The funeral services were conducted Tuesday at 2:30 at the Baptist church by the Rev. G. E. Morphy assisted by Rev. Henry Clark, pastor of the Baptist church at Greely, Col., who accompanied the body here at the request of the members of the church and as their representative. He leaves to mourn his loss besides his children, his mother seven sisters and three brothers.
