A nice set of mats is made of knitting cotton and yellow saxon, 1st Row: Chain 6, join in circle; 2nd row: 48 dbj under 6 ch; 3rd row: 4 dbj with 2 ch between; 4th: 3 dbj under each ch of 2; 5th: 1 dbj in each of 3rd row; 6: 5 ch single in every 3 dbj; 7th: 5 ch a c on 5 ch; 8th: 4 dbj under 5 ch; 9th: dbj on e ch of 4 dot; 10th: ch 5 single ch on 4 dbj; 11th: ch 5 single on 5 ch; 12th: 5 trbl under 5 ch; 13th: 5 ch single on every 4 tr; 14th: Begin with yellow now. Ch 5 single in middle of 5 ch making 2 rows like the last. Run baby ribbon in open spaces to make small mats: make up to 8th row and then add 2 rows of yellow, running baby ribbon in the 6th row on small mats. Make 1 large mat and 3 small one for a set.

IGNORED THE COURTS.

Sherman M. Bell, Adjutant General of the State of Colorado.

The recent clash of civil and military authority in Colorado, which caused a profound sensation throughout the state, was an outgrowth of the miners' strike that has kept the state in turmoil for months and caused the loss of millions of dollars.

General Bell, who is in charge of the troops at Telluride, where martial law is in force, had President C. H. Moyer of the Western Federation of Miners in custody. Judge Stevens of the district court issued a writ of habeas corpus commanding that Moyer be produced in court. Bell ignored the writ.

The supreme court then took a hand and ordered Moyer to be brought before it. General Bell again ignored the civil authority and refused to produce Moyer until commanded to do so by Governor Peabody.

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
OLD JAPANESE SWORDS.

Artistic Skill With Which the Swords Were Wrought.

In feudal Japan the sword was the most important of all weapons in war and for personal adornment, and upon the weapon the Japanese lavished all the resources of their art. The forging of the blade became a high art, and its experts won great fame and honor.

After the blade the most important part of a Japanese sword is the tsuba, or guard, a flat piece of metal usually circular or oval in form, perforated by a triangular aperture for the admission of the blade.

At either side is one or more openings for the lodgment of two other



accessories called the kodzuka, or small dagger, and the kogai, or skewer.

The skewer usually has upon its handle some pattern or model corresponding in some way with the crest or monogram of the owner. Its use is threefold to the soldier. Sometimes he takes it from its place and puts it in his hair to hold it in its place. In camp it is often used as a chopstick by him.

How the Russians Prevent the Escape of Chinese Prisoners.

Since the outbreak of hostilities in the far east the predatory bands of Chinese outlaws which infest Manchuria have caused great annoyance to the Russians. These bands have always lived by robbery, and the advent of the Slav has seriously interfered with their vocation.

In revenge they harass the Russian outposts and sometimes blow up sections of the railway. They fight des-

perately when cornered, well knowing that capture means a quick trial and speedy death.
