## Editorial Department

### PATRIOTISM

Some of us as we grow older are apt to forget the lessons of patriotism and love of liberty that were so impressively taught us in our youthful days by the pomp and pagantry, the noise and fireworks and the hubbalooboo of the Fourth of July.

We would prefer a day of rest, a quiet picnic or an extra long morning nap, perhaps. But how about the boys? Have not the children of today as much right to demand that we make the Fourth bright and rosy for them as our fathers did for us?

It is not entirely a question of dollars and cents, it is a question of civic pride, of patriotism, of love for our little ones.

The fire cracker that is so obnoxious at fifty is the very acme of delight to the ten year old.

It is against the very commercial idea that we must strive if patriotism is not to become a dead letter.

It is nearly a year since Denison has done anything in the way of a public enterprise, or that our business men have been called upon to contribute for a public purpose. There can be no complaint on the score of frequent solicitations. We sincerely hope there is enough public spirit left in Denison to get up a creditable celebration of the Nation's birth.

As an alumnus of the State University we wish to say that we utterly disapprove the injudicious, ill-advised and unseemingly course of the alumni at Davenport and other cities relative to President MacLean.

Several days ago it was announced that a committee of distinguished alumni would go to Iowa City to investigate the President of the institution and report against him.

Judge Bolinger—nothing if not dramatic now as in his school days—headed the committee and at a public meeting of Davenport resolutions were passed demanding that the President be removed on very serious charges that some of the faculty did not like him and that the number of students had not increased of late.

Certainly these are charges for which a man should be pilloried, should be exhibited in the museum of the Register and Leader along with the man with three wives.

Judge Bolinger is not fit to sit on the bench if he would condemn a petty thief on such a hearing and yet he has headed a movement which means life long disgrace and ignominy to a man against whose honor we have heard no single word.

The alumni of other cities not to be outdone, and without awaiting the force of a committee "to investigate and report against" have also produced violent resolutions. One of these vitriolic resolutions is fathered by a man who told us but a short time ago that he had not visited his alma mater in the last dozen years.

We confess to occupying the unique position of being almost the only alumnus in the state who does not know the exact status of the university and who confesses incompetency to investigate and condemn the President, or to direct the Board of Regents.

We are not therefore prepared to defend the President. We are not defending him. We are admitting that we do not know.

But this we do know that the course adopted by the Alumni has been a travesty on justice and fairness and of greater injury to the university—than even a poor President would be for a dozen years.

They do these things much better—oh—almost any other place. If it were true that the President was not popular with the faculty and that his continuance in office was a detriment to the school, why did not Judge Bolinger and his committee proceed quietly and decently? Why all these brass bands and display resolutions? The matter could have been investigated, reported, and the regents conferred with, without publicity, without delivering a body-blow to the institution and without everlastingly damning a man against who no criminal charges at least have been made.

We are not defending the President. We do not know. We do not know Professor Calvin McBride, Nutting Andrews and others and as between them and the President it would not take us long to decide. We do not think it would have taken the regents long to decide either.

The alumni resolutions remind us of a certain petition once forwarded to Gov. Jackson urging that a certain murderer be hanged.

Governor Jackson waxed wroth and answered that he was not "hanging by petition", that it was a painful duty fallen to him by law to sign the death warrant in certain cases, that only the most earnest conviction of justice could move him, and that a petition that a man be hanged was at once an insult to the executive and to the decency and influence of the signers.

Governor Jackson's letter was much to the point in the present instances.

How quickly our popular songs become back numbers. But a few years ago McGinty "was the ruler of the bottom of the sea," and now both Russia and Japan are disputing his possessions.

Is it not about time that the Register and Leader followed the very excellent example set by Governor Cummins and get on the republican platform with both feet, square in the middle of it?

The hind sight of the Register and Leader as to the republican platform is most conspicuous. Had it been as zealous in support of its ideas prior to the convention the platform might have suited it better.

Parker stock is now on the boom and the Bulletin doubtless begins to wish it had not printed so many fiery editorials against him this spring. The Bulletin should beware of the deadly parallel column this fall.

There is but one man whom the democrats can nominate who will be seriously considered by the American people, and he is Joseph W. Folk, of Missouri. The only reason he would be so considered is because he is the nearest approach the democrats have to that stalwart American, Theodore Roosevelt.

a big procession including the governor and his staff. After the procession the exercises will be held at the Iowa building Ex-Governor Larrabee presiding.

Fritz Boek, an aged German living near Traer, committed suicide last Wednesday by hanging. He had been melancholy for several months which is the only reason assigned for the deed.

One night last week while putting up the horse and carriage after a drive, Curtis Galpin of Boone came to blows with a tramp whom he found lurking in the barn and in the scuffle he was shot through the lung, an inlet lodging just under the scoulder blade. The tramp escaped and no clue as to his identity has been discovered.

Last Tuesday afternoon the little town of Tara near Fort Dodge was struck by a tornado, blowing down buildings and windmills and uprooting trees. Nine box cars standing on the Illinois Central tracks were blown from the tracks, seriously injuring a tramp. Telephone and telegraph wires were also blown down and for several hours the town was cut off from the outside world.
